RELATIONSHIP TO ROTORUA DISTRICT PLAN

The Lakes A Zone shall be Part Twenty of the District Plan.

Note: The full text of Rule 1.1 as at 13 May 2000 (the date the Lakes A Zone was notified as Variation Twelve) is contained in a separate document entitled 'Rule 1.1 of the Lakes A Zone'. The reader is advised that the full text version of Rule 1.1 should be used to determine relevant provisions within the Lakes A Zone. Equivalent provisions in the District *Plan* contain some differences, due to amendments made to them after 13 May 2000, which do not apply within the Lakes A Zone.

The following provisions of the District *Plan* (contained in this Rule as it existed at 13 May 2000) shall continue to apply within the Lakes A Zone.

Part Five Maori Development

For the purpose of applying the Financial Contribution Rules for Subdivision and *Development* and Reserves and Heritage Purposes to the Lakes A Zone, the following rules on interpretation shall apply:

The terms 'lot or lease area' shall be read to mean 'site', as defined in Section 10.0 of Volume 1 of the Lakes A Zone.

The District *Plan* definitions of *development*, *household unit*, *subsidiary household unit* and *tourist accommodation* apply. These definitions, as existed at 13 May 2000, have been included in **Section 10** of **Volume 1** of the Lakes A Zone.

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1.2 RULES TABLES, STATUS OF ACTIVITIES, INTERDEPENDENCE OF RULES AND ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

1.2.1 RULES TABLES

The Rules Tables state:

- the Permitted Activities and the conditions for Permitted Activities; and
- the Controlled, Restricted Discretionary and Discretionary Activities and the standards and terms for those activities; and
- Non-Complying Activities.

1.2.2 PLANNING MAPS

Reference shall be made to the relevant Planning Map for the Lakes A Zone to determine which Policy Area(s) and Rule Management Area(s) applies to the *land* or *site*.

1.2.3 DETERMINING THE STATUS OF AN ACTIVITY

- (1) Unless otherwise specified in the Rules Tables:
 - (a) All Activities that do not contravene any Rule in this *plan* shall be *Permitted Activities*.
 - (b) All Activities that cannot comply with the *conditions* for *Permitted Activities* shall be *Discretionary Activities*.
 - (c) All Activities that cannot comply with one or more of the standards that apply to *Controlled* or *Restricted Discretionary Activities* shall be *Discretionary Activities*.
 - (d) All Activities that cannot comply with any one or more of the standards that apply to *Discretionary Activities* (where these are specified), shall be *Non-Complying Activities*.

For the avoidance of doubt the *effects* of the entire application/proposal will be considered when any Activity defaults to *Controlled*, *Discretionary* or *Non-Complying* in accordance with (1)(b) to (d) above.

(2) Where a proposal comprises a number of different activities or *effects* (i.e. a number of Rules apply) and has a combination of statuses, then the stricter status test shall be applied e.g. a proposal with *Controlled* and *Discretionary* statuses would be considered as *Discretionary*.

1.2.4 INTERDEPENDENCE OF RULES

The Rules are divided into Six broad groups – Activities, *Building* Design, *Effects*, Infrastructure and Utility Services, Subdivision and Consultation - and are designed to function interdependently. Each applicant will need to determine on a case by case basis which rules are relevant to that proposal.

1.2 RULES TABLES, STATUS OF ACTIVITIES, INTERDEPENDENCE OF RULES AND ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

Generally **Rules 2.0 to 16.0** and **30.0 to 37.0** will apply to the stated activity. **Rules 17.0 to 25.0** are *Building* Design Rules. **Rules 26.0 to 29.0** are *Effects* Rules that apply to any activity. For any *building* activity after a *site* has been subdivided, all Activity, *Building* Design, *Effects* and Infrastructure and Utility Services and Consultation Rules apply where relevant. Provided that, for those *sites* that are Scheduled Sites, the Rules as set out in **Rule 42.0** shall apply. **Rule 43** applies to Tangata Whenua Structure Plans.

1.2.5 NOTIFICATION

All *Controlled* and *Restricted Discretionary Activity* applications can be considered without the need to obtain the written approval of affected persons. Where Council considers special circumstances exist in relation to any application for a *Controlled* or *Restricted Discretionary Activity* consent, the application may be notified. Notwithstanding the above, where approval is sought for *Restricted Discretionary Activities* relating to solar access and *building platforms*, affected parties consent is required.

In addition, these areas have important biodiversity values. Some have been identified as significant, and others are likely to have potential values as ecological corridors. Because of these values the removal of *indigenous vegetation* is limited to that which is of poor or marginal quality and which is essential for

housing purposes within the settlement management areas. In particular, Council wishes to retain all *indigenous vegetation* in *riparian areas* to protect the integrity of the *land/water* interface ecology and natural character of the *lakes* and *lake* margins. This protective approach will preserve the natural character of the Lakes A Zone including ecological corridors, indigenous terrestrial fauna and adjacent aquatic habitats.

Explanation and Principal Reasons

A healthy riparian margin is pivotal to protecting the natural character of the *lakes* and their margins, and aquatic habitats in the *lakes*, which are an essential part of the natural character. Management of the *disturbance* of *exotic vegetation* in *riparian areas* is intended to ensure that these natural character and heritage values are retained in a way that meshes the equivalent values provided by *indigenous vegetation*. Outside the *riparian areas exotic vegetation disturbance* in the Lakes A Zone is not specifically regulated except as identified in **Rule 3.0**, but is permitted subject to compliance with the remaining provisions of this *Plan*. Replacement of existing *exotic vegetation* with indigenous or longer-rotation *exotic vegetation* is not required, although it may be encouraged where that is desirable. Appropriate replacement vegetation will maintain and enhance the values and features listed in **Policy P8.1**.

Explanation and Principal Reasons

The Lakes A Zone has numerous outstanding natural features and landscapes that can be viewed from a range of locations. These are identified on the Planning Maps. Council wishes to ensure that over time exotic trees do not block the specified views to and from outstanding features and landscapes.

Removal of *pest plants* is permitted as it is important that they are able to be controlled to protect the values provided by indigenous and beneficial or benign *exotic vegetation*.

It is not the intention of Council to prevent forest harvesting. However, there are specific controls to manage the *effects* of logging traffic through the settlement areas. In the covenanted area by Tikitapu Council desires to ensure the wider public interest is taken into account at the time of harvesting should the present covenant be altered.

Much of the Lakes A Zone soils are a product of the Tarawera eruption. The 'Rotomahana mud soils' are prone to erosion and therefore Council intends to manage *earthworks* relatively strictly to ensure minimal sedimentation in the *lakes* and scouring of the landforms. Both of these adversely affect *indigenous vegetation*, terrestrial and aquatic habitats, natural character and outstanding landforms. Additionally, *earthworks* (cuts and fills) have the potential to adversely affect the natural character and landscapes of the Zone in a direct way. Fills are controlled to a lesser dimension than cuts because of the need to ensure compaction is carried out sufficiently well not to result in a hazard to future *building* and to ensure stormwater is managed.

Explanation and Principal Reasons

Buildings can have an adverse *effect* on natural character. The *building platform* rule recognises and provides for important elements that make up the natural character of the Lakes A Zone such as vegetation *disturbance*, *earthworks*, *riparian areas* and the *slope* of *land* and takes these into account in determining the position on a *site* where *development* can occur. The *building platform* rule also takes into account natural hazards such as flooding and areas of *land* instability in determining whether the precise location of a *building* on a *site* is suitable from a human safety perspective.

Building developments have the greatest potential to adversely affect natural character and landscapes. By their nature *lake structures* tend to be highly visible. The options for avoiding or mitigating their *effects* on the natural character of the *lakes* and their margins, and on aquatic habitats, are limited compared with those available for *buildings* and *structures* on the *land*. However, Council accepts that there is already a degree of built character in the *lake* margins in front of the settlements from jetties and boatsheds. There is thus a distinction in the level of natural character between these areas and elsewhere in the *lakes*. There is also a distinction between *public lake structures* and private ones as Council believes that a method of avoiding a proliferation of *lake structures* to be used by individuals is to provide public ones to meet the demands. This also limits the private occupation of public space.

When the Lakes A Zone was notified in May 2000 (as Variation Twelve to the Proposed District *Plan*) it contained **Rule 18.0** which related to Gross Floor Area. Council as a result of submissions to **Rule 18.0** decided that this *building* design Rule was not necessary and that it be deleted. However, because there are numerous references within the Lakes A Zone text linking to the various Rules that follow **Rule 18.0**, it was considered that subsequent Rules not be renumbered in case a rule that linked or referred to another rule was missed by mistake. If such a rule was missed it would create confusion to all*plan*Users. It is for this reason that this Rule is now shown as Intentionally Blank.
