Open spaces: overview

Dedicated open spaces and reserves are found in both urban and rural locations throughout the district. The spaces vary in size, but all make an important contribution to the quality of life of Rotorua residents and visitors. They provide opportunities for active and passive recreation, social interaction, preservation and enhancement of biodiversity, landscape and amenity values, cultural heritage and in some cases provide access to lakes and waterways.

The open spaces theme monitors one environmental indicator- the area of reserves available per 1000 Rotorua residents.

How are we going?

In Rotorua there are 12.3 hectares per 1000 residents, which compares favourably with other councils with similar sized populations. This is the first time this indicator has been reported on for State of Environment reporting purposes. Changes will be monitored and documented in the next reporting period.

What are we doing?

Currently, three reserve management plans are in place for rural, urban and township reserves. Council also has an open spaces strategy. This lays the foundation for provision of open space in relation to land development and subdivision, parks and recreation facilities, roading and other engineering projects, strategic purchase of land, retention of view shafts, and a sustainable open space network.

The district plan is under review and will consider open space issues such as reserve contributions and public access to lake margins. Research projects relative to this topic are the landscape assessment studies and eastern and western structure plans.

The purpose of the landscape assessment studies is to identify outstanding natural features and landscapes, which are an important contributor to the aesthetic, social, cultural, and recreational experience of both residents and visitors.

Structure plans are a management tool for planning future growth and development. Good planning provides open spaces, enhancing quality of life for residents and providing associated environmental benefits such as ecosystem services and habitat connectivity.

Purpose of indicator

The type and number of parks and reserves is measured and monitored to ensure reserves are adequately managed and the number is increased.

Current information and trend

Almost 80% of the total area of reserves (832.6ha) is for recreational purposes (Table 5.1). Many of these also protect waterways and access to waterways.

Other reserves are created for a variety of purposes including future roading, utilities, preschool education, community use, accessways and drainage. They comprise 35.9 ha, or 4 3% of the total reserve area

There are 11.3 ha of esplanade reserves, which constitute 1.4% of the total area of reserves.

There are only two council owned scenic reserves in the district. The main purpose of scenic reserves is to provide protection and preservation of areas of scenic interest, beauty, natural features or landscapes. There are other scenic reserves in the district which are not owned by Council.

'Unreserved' land is maintained as reserve, even though it has no legal status under the Reserves Act. This applies to many areas that were purchased by Council but never given legal reserve status, and other areas such as legal roads on streams and lake margins. This land does not have the same level of protection under the Reserves Act but is still protected under the Local Government Act and district plan.

The average area of reserves per 1000 residents for councils, shown in Table 5.2, is 9.34 hectares. Rotorua has

12.3 hectares of reserve per 1000 Rotorua residents (Tables 5.1 and 5.2) which compares favourably against other North Island councils of similar population sizes.
