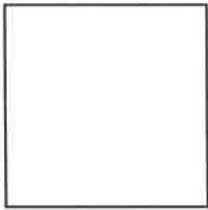

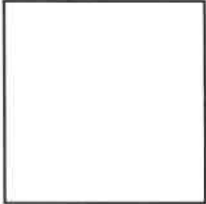

MANA WHENUA PARTNERSHIPS – THREE WATERS

Report prepared by: Gina Rangi, DCE Te Arawa Partnerships

**1. TE PŪTAKE
PURPOSE**

The purpose of this report is to recommend the establishment of a committee to consider the impact of the proposed Three Waters Reform on Council's relationships with mana whenua, and make recommendation to Council and mana whenua on the same.

**2. NGĀ TŪTOHUNGA
RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 1. That the report 'Mana Whenua Partnerships' – Three waters Reform' be received**
- 2. That Council resolves to establish a committee in accordance with Schedule 7, S30 (1) (a) (Attachment 1) to:**
 - a) Consider the impacts of the Three Waters Reform on Council's partnerships with mana whenua,**
and
 - b) Make recommendation to the Council and to mana whenua on the same.**
- 3. That the membership of the Committee be:**
 - a) 5 Councillors namely: Her Worship Mayor Chadwick, Deputy Mayor Dave Donaldson, Councillors Tapsell, Raukawa-Tait and Maxwell.**
 - b) 5 representatives of mana whenua.**
- 4. That the mana whenua partnership groups will meet to agree their representatives and will notify Council accordingly.**
- 5. That the Committee co-chairs be the Mayor and one of the mana whenua representatives.**

**3. TE TĀHUHU
BACKGROUND**

Existing relationships

Prior to establishing the Te Arawa Partnership, Rotorua Lakes Council went through a period of poor relationships with mana whenua leading to failed applications for resource consent (for example, the original Rotoiti Wastewater Treatment Plant) or consent conditions that were unfavourable to Council (for example, reduced consent term for the Taniwha Springs water take). Council recognised that it needed to work with mana whenua in a different way if it was to achieve key infrastructure objectives.

In addition, a number of Treaty settlement processes have occurred within the district, which also create binding obligations for Council.

Consequently, Council currently has a number of relationships with mana whenua specifically relating to lakes, springs, rivers and other waterbodies:

Te Arawa Lakes Strategy Group ("TALSG")

- Established under the Te Arawa Lakes Settlement Act 2006, the TALSG is a permanent joint committee of BOPRC, RLC and Te Arawa Lakes Trust ("TALT") that coordinates policy and actions to improve the Te Arawa lakes.
- Membership is appointed by Regional Council (2), Council (2) and TALT (2), as well as representation from the Minister for the Environment.
- Operational decisions to manage the Programme are made at the Partnership Steering Group, made up of senior managers from the partner organisations and the Ministry for the Environment.
- TALSG (including Rotorua Lakes Council) and the Crown signed a Memorandum of Understanding to establish a formal working relationship between the Crown and TALSG, and a Deed of Funding committing the Ministry for the Environment to providing funding. Rotorua Lakes Council has received Crown subsidies for Three Waters projects under the Deed of Funding.

Waikato River catchment - Raukawa and Te Arawa River Iwi ("TARIT")

- The Ngāti Tūwharetoa, Raukawa, and Te Arawa River Iwi Waikato River Act 2010 provides for co-governance and co-management (between Councils and iwi) in the Waikato river catchment.
- That Act requires Council to enter into Joint Management Agreements with Raukawa and with TARIT. Those JMAs set out how Council and Raukawa/TARIT will work together in respect of the Waikato River catchment, and are legally binding.
- The Act also provides that the Vision and Strategy for the Waikato River has legal effect/status under both the Resource Management Act and Local Government Act.

Te Puna a Pekehaua (Taniwha Springs)

- Te Puna a Pekehaua (Taniwha Springs) is Māori land, owned by trustees, who allow Council access to the spring to take drinking water and supply it to Ngongotahā (and Te Koutu in an emergency).
- This includes a lease and easement to access the springs, as well as agreement that the trustees and Council will jointly apply for (and jointly hold) the necessary resource consents.

Rotoiti/Rotomā wastewater treatment plant

- Council has a number of agreements with mana whenua to enable the Rotoiti/Rotomā wastewater treatment scheme.
- This includes a lease of Māori land with Haumingi 9B3B trustees (for the plant itself), an MoU providing for specific environmental works (also recorded in resource consent conditions), and an Iwi Liaison Group.

Central North Island Iwi

- Council has an easement allowing for spray irrigation of recovered water to land owned by CNI Iwi.
- Council is also working with CNI iwi (including Tūhourangi-Ngāti Wāhiao and Ngāti Whakaue) to develop a new Sustainable Forest Approach for the future.

Te Maru o Kaituna

- Te Maru o Kaituna River Authority is a co-governance partnership (established through the Tapuika Claims Settlement Act 2014) to restore, protect and enhance the environmental, cultural and spiritual wellbeing of the Kaituna River.
- A permanent joint committee of Rotorua Lakes Council, the Bay of Plenty Regional Council, Western Bay of Plenty District Council and Tauranga City Council. Its members are appointed equally by mana whenua and by the relevant Councils (including Rotorua Lakes Council).
- The committee has power to develop the Kaituna River Document, which has legal effect/status under both the Resource Management Act and Local Government Act.

Ngati Rangitihi Claims Settlement Bill.

- Establishes a permanent joint committee of BOPRC, with the purpose “to support, co-ordinate, and promote the integrated restoration of the mauri of the catchment” for the Tarawera River.
- The committee will have power to develop the Tarawera Awa Restoration Strategy, which has legal effect/status under both the Resource Management Act and Local Government Act. The membership includes 4 Council and 4 iwi representatives.
- The Bill has passed its first reading.

Three Waters Reform

Central government is carrying out a process to reform the ownership and management of New Zealand’s three waters infrastructure and related services. This is a significant and intergenerational proposed change. On 7 September 2020, Council signed a Memorandum of Understanding and associated Funding Agreement and Delivery Plan. The MoU provides

“The Parties also recognise the reform programme will give rise to rights and interests under the Treaty of Waitangi and both Parties acknowledge the role of the Treaty partner. This includes maintaining Treaty settlement obligations and other statutory rights including under the Resource Management Act 1991 and the Local Government Act 2002. The outcome of discussions with iwi/Māori will inform design of appropriate mechanisms to reflect Treaty interests. This will include clarity of roles and responsibilities.”

The Government has also established the Joint Three Waters Steering Committee to provide oversight and guidance to support progress of those reforms, and to assist in engaging with local government, iwi and other water sector stakeholders. The steering committee comprises an independent chair, local government mayors, chairs and CEs, representatives of LGNZ and Taituarā (Local Government Professionals Aotearis), as well as Crown officials (from DIA, Taumata Arowau, MBIE and the Treasury). There is no iwi representation on the Steering Committee.

On 30 June 2020, the Minister for Local Government released further information regarding the reforms and the proposed entities to be established. In the coming months Council will be required to make a decision on the proposed reforms, including whether to transfer its community assets to a new 3 Waters entity, which will have responsibility for the future provision of 3 Waters services to communities.

Council and mana whenua partners have entered into good faith relationships, supported by legally binding commitments. However, there is currently no formal process for Council and our mana whenua partners to discuss the 3 Waters reform, to identify risks and opportunities, and to co-ordinate our respective responses to the proposed 3 Waters Reforms (and Council’s relationship commitments).

4. TE MATAPAKI ME NGĀ KŌWHIRINGA DISCUSSION AND OPTIONS SECTIONS

The options available include

- (1) Status quo. Currently, Council and Te Arawa are separately engaging with central Government. Although there have been informal discussions (including in Protocol committee meetings and at an operational level), there is no forum for discussing the impact on existing relationship agreements, nor for developing a unified, coordinated Council/iwi position.
- (2) Engage with each Te Arawa entity separately (particularly those with Protocol Agreements, Joint Management Agreements or other relationship agreements) to identify potential impacts of the Three Waters Reform, seek agreement on how to respond and agree amendments to their agreements.
- (3) Establish a Council Committee as a forum for governance oversight, to identify and develop shared concerns and aspirations, to understand the effects on relationship agreements, and to ensure well-informed, co-ordinated decision-making of the parties.

Discussion

It is important that Council (and mana whenua) understand the impact of the proposed reforms on Council's existing partnerships, and identify opportunities for a co-ordinated response to Government (as well as where there might be different Council/iwi views). That will ensure a more robust, well-informed and co-ordinated approach to decision-making by Council and by mana whenua entities. Accordingly, it is proposed that a committee be established as the forum for discussion and reaching agreement (where possible).

Because the committee focuses on existing relationships, it is suggested that the representatives of Council be drawn from the elected members who are already appointed to those relationship committees. That will ensure good familiarity with the issues to be considered. Because of the number of mana whenua groups, it is not proposed that each entity be directly represented, but instead that they agree on five mana whenua representatives to appoint to the committee.

A power of recommendation is appropriate because it recognises the separate roles and responsibilities of Te Arawa and Council. It is an approach that is based on 'mana ōrite' (separate but equal authority), and provides for the partners' different roles and responsibilities while still ensuring informed, co-ordinated decision-making.

It is also noted that Te Tatau o Te Arawa explicitly does not have a role to override direct discussions between Council and mana whenua. In this case, there are relationship agreements with particular Te Arawa groups, and those agreements will be directly affected by the proposed Three Waters Reforms. For that reason, it is recommended that the affected groups meet to identify 5 Te Arawa representatives (and that hui should be called with Te Tatau support).

Legal framework

Clause 3 section 41A of the Local Government Act 2002 provides for the Mayor:

1. to establish committees of the territorial authority.
2. to appoint the chairperson of each committee established and make the appointment before the other members of the committee are determined.
3. may appoint himself or herself to the committees.

However, nothing in this section limits or prevents a Council from discharging or reconstituting committees or chairpersons of those committees established by the Mayor by way of Council resolution at a later date. The Mayor can decline to exercise the powers outlined above.

Delegations set out the functions, duties, or powers (except those that must be exercised by the full council) for each committee of council. A committee can further delegate functions, duties, and powers to subcommittees unless prohibited by its council. All delegations by council's or committees must be recorded in a delegations register that must be found in the council's governance statement.

The Local Government Act 2002, Schedule 7 (32) provides that a local authority:

(1) may delegate to a committee or other subordinate decision-making body, community board, or member or officer of the local authority any of its responsibilities, duties, or powers except —

(a) The power to make a rate; or

(b) The power to make a bylaw; or

(c) The power to borrow money, or purchase or dispose of assets, other than in accordance with the long-term plan; or

(d) The power to adopt a long-term plan, annual plan, or annual report; or

(e) The power to appoint a chief executive; or

(f) The power to adopt policies required to be adopted and consulted on under this Act in association with the Long-term Plan or developed for the purpose of the local governance statement.

(2) Nothing in this clause restricts the power of a local authority to delegate to a committee or other subordinate decision-making body, community board, or member or officer of the local authority the power to do anything precedent to the exercise by the local authority (after consultation with the committee or body or person) of any power or duty specified in subclause (1).

(3) A committee or other subordinate decision-making body, community board, or member or officer of the local authority may delegate any of its responsibilities, duties, or powers to a subcommittee or person, subject to any conditions, limitations, or prohibitions imposed by the local authority or by the committee or body or person that makes the delegation.

(4) A committee, subcommittee, other subordinate decision-making body, community board, or member or officer of the local authority to which or to whom any responsibilities, powers, or duties are delegated may, without confirmation by the local authority or committee or body or person that made the delegation, exercise or perform them in the like manner and with the same effect as the local authority could itself have exercised or performed them

(5) A local authority may delegate to any other local authority, organisation, or person the enforcement, inspection, licensing, and administration related to bylaws and other regulatory matters.

(6) A territorial authority must consider whether or not to delegate to a community board if the delegation would enable the community board to best achieve its role.

(7) To avoid doubt, no delegation relieves the local authority, member, or officer of the liability or legal responsibility to perform or ensure performance of any function or duty.

(8) The delegation powers in this clause are in addition to any power of delegation a local authority has under any other enactment.

**5. TE TINO AROMATAWAI
ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

The decisions or matters of this report are not considered significant in accordance with the Council's Policy on Significance.

**6. NGĀ KŌRERO O TE HAPORI ME TE WHAKATAIRANGA
COMMUNITY INPUT/ENGAGEMENT AND PUBLICITY**

The Council is not required to consult on this matter. The establishment of committees is a provision of the Local Government Act 2002.

**7. HE WHAIWHAKAARO
CONSIDERATIONS**

**7.1 Mahere Pūtea
Financial/budget considerations**

Remuneration of elected members is set by the Remuneration Authority and is already provided for in the governance budgets. It is proposed that the elected members for Te Arawa be remunerated at a similar rate as external appointees to other Council committees. The budget impact for those fees is expected to be less than \$25,000.

**7.2 Kaupapa Here me ngā Hiraunga Whakariterite
Policy and planning implications**

Clauses 10, 11, 14 and clause 19, 30(1) and 31 of Schedule 7 of the Local Government Act 2002 provide for the establishment of a governance structure in which council use to make decision in line with their objectives and future direction.

**7.3 Tūraru
Risks**

There are no major risks associated with the decisions or matters.

**7.4 Te Whaimana
Authority**

The Mayor has the authority to make a decision on a structure for committees under the Local Government Act Section 41A

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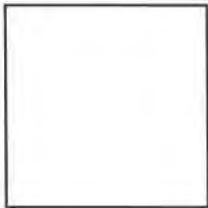

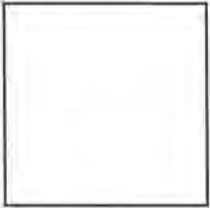

Mayor Chadwick welcomed everyone present and thanked Kingi for acknowledging the passing of our leaders.

The Mayor also welcomed Co-Chair Deliah Balle & new TARIT Trustee Peri Marks.

5. RLC (Rotorua Lakes Council) Project update

Stavros Michael (DCE – Environmental & Infrastructure Solutions) gave a brief of his role and introduced Regan Fraser (Infrastructure Manager), then continued to speak to a powerpoint presentation titled “Three Waters Reform Proposed”. (Attachment 1)

Since the Havelock North contamination issue, Government identified a number of concerns, highlighted in the Presentation.

Stavros Michael advised that he is a member of two steering groups working with the government to evaluate and assess the Three waters reform options.

1. A national group led by the Department of Internal Affairs

Focussed on evaluating the current condition and challenges faced by the three waters infrastructure across all Territorial Local Authorities. The steering group exchanges technical views about asset management practice, long term investment required to meet new performance standards and regulations, and to ensure that the communities’ levels of service are protected. Another element of this Group’s workings relates to establishing appropriate involvement of Iwi in these reforms and how mana whenua views and cultural

objectives are taken into consideration in the future strategies and networks management of the Three Waters.

2. A Regional Steering Group

Assisted by Local Government NZ and it covers some 16 TLAs in the Waikato and the Bay of Plenty region. This group is focussed on exploring the option of a regional water entity set up in collaboration with all the 16 TLAs and the Government. To provide a good basis for forming a proposal to be considered by all the 16 communities the group has undertaken a stocktake of the current services and the future demand taking into consideration growth and environmental improvement expectations. In the near future the Group will explore options for governance and community participation into such proposal especially from the perspective of ensuring protection of the local identities and the unique characters of those communities and their partnerships with Iwi and Hapu. RLC has a strong view that such entity must demonstrate readiness to take their direction from local communities and to work closely and in partnership to give effect to the Te Arawa 2050 vision.

Further discussion took place around the reform and TARITS position. TARIT supported the establishment of the waters services regulator and the need for a reform.

Eugene Berryman-Kamp spoke further about TARITS submission to the Bill and outlined the following:

- That Crown retains its obligations to hapu and iwi to uphold the treaty.
- Major concerns for our smaller hapu, how do they compete against the major players
- Recommend that Clause 56 be amended to provide for specific exemptions for Marae & Papakainga to be included in the definition of domestic self-supply
- Support the implementation of Local and Regional water bodies overseeing the decisions rather than National

Action: Eugene Berryman-Kamp to provide a copy of TARIT's submission to Gina Rangi to share with the team.

Stavros Michael reminded all about the good examples here in Rotorua:

Agreement with Ngāti Rangiwewehi.

RLC's approach is, yes there is a need to provide water supply to the community, but there are also cultural, manawhenua and iwi expectation. We are co-owners of the resource consent, working together to co-manage drinking water from their stream. This is unique and doesn't happen in many places. It's important not to lose the gains and the advantages of this kind of approach.

Most government and local councils say, it's spring water, we need it, end of story.

Geoff Williams gave a summary of his opinion with the concern that when it comes to being prioritized we could end up near the bottom of the list, similar to our Rooding priorities at the moment. Ie: The big places like Tauranga & Hamilton with major water challenges will take priority.

Eugene Berryman-Kamp noted that TARIT work in partnership with t Waikato River Iwi, Tuwharetoa, Te Arawa, Raukawa, Tainui, Ngati Maniapoto & I also attend River Iwi managers meeting in Taupo. Although we've forwarded our submission I haven't appreciated the power of submitting a combined submission until this meeting.

Peri Marks made comment to co-management being an equal share between both parties.

Gina Rangi expressed her concerns with the proposal form noting that the crown has a very narrow view of what iwi interests are. Iwi have many difference interests in many different roles as mana whenua. Current legislation is not providing for those different roles and different hats that we wear. If legislation doesn't provide for it, then its doubtful that the crown will have an understanding of the multitude of interests when it comes to the three waters.

In this district we have been on a programme of increasing services to smaller communities, working with mana whenua, where we can.

Under these reforms those assets will transfer to other bodies, and that relationship will come to an end. It could mean a lack of access of services for small rural communities. We need to work together on trying to build on a very strong case and claim our territory in this space.

Further discussion took place about TARIT members and connections with other National groups ie: Fresh water iwi leaders technical advisory group, TALT, Waikato River iwi etc.

Deliah Balle - Iwi are under resourced and have to spread themselves to ensure that the values are heard so the reductionist approach doesn't work for iwi. The Te Arawa partnership with RLC is an example where engagement doesn't become a tick box exercise, we're actually working.

Further discussion took place around Te Ao Māori view.

Mayor Chadwick: Rather than sit and wait for reforms to overwhelm us we need to get on and develop a model that matters and is significant to us/Te Arawa. We're currently stretched trying to respond to co-governance groups so this would be a space to get moving.

6. TARIT (Te Arawa River Iwi Trust)/ updates

- 2020 marked 10 years since Te Arawa Tuwharetoa & Raukawa Waikato River Iwi act was enacted.
- The object of the hōe was to paddle in waters of all the river iwi along the way, (Tuwharetoa, Te Arawa, Raukawa, Waikato, Tainui & Ngāti Maniapoto waters) and to engage with them along the way.
- Also to physically see and experience the quality of the water from source through to the mouth.

Engagements:

- 29 April – Ngāti Tahu & Ngāti Whaio will have a specific DIA engagement hui at Ohakei around the 3 water.
- Also working with TALT on a Te Arawa engagement workshop with DIA.
- Working with MFE on RMA reform
- Working with MFE & DIA on 3 waters and MFE on rights and interests

- Focus has been working with Elva Conroy (Conroy & Donald Consultants) on the EMP (Environmental management plan). Ensuring plan is fit for purpose, until at least 2026.

- First electronic copy of the draft was presented yesterday.
- Most significant changes from the 2015 version was around restructure of the policy chapters.
- The plan, objectives and sections are clustered via purpose in this improved plan navigation

- Do not have iwi members or land

- Our affiliates are best placed to do the actual environmental projects, using their people on their whenua in their approach.
- TARIT support affiliates to make applications

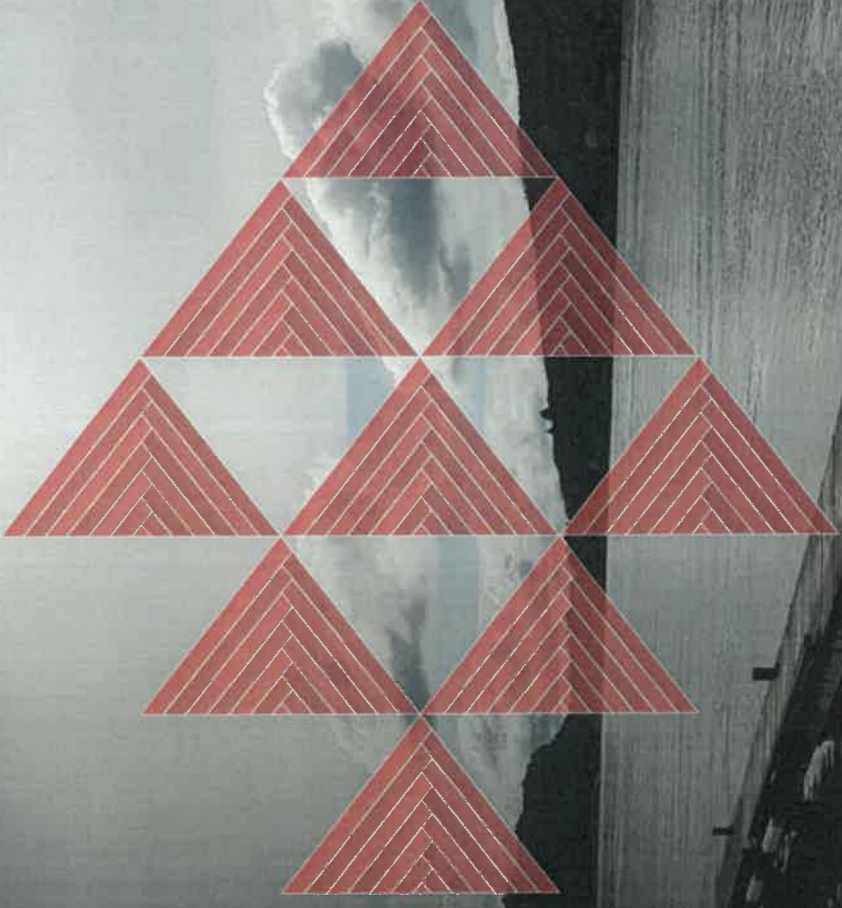


Figure 2. How regional *linggala* might give effect to the *linggala* in the WUI

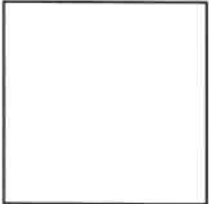

The committee is not addressing the full scope of the impact of the 3 Waters reform. Its scope is limited to entities that have existing contracts/agreements with Council who may find themselves dealing with the proposed new Entity B (instead of council), and recognition that those entities may need to review and amend their existing agreements to ensure they are not negatively impacted by any reform.

In terms of the broader impact of the reforms on Te Arawa rights and interests, those are being addressed directly between iwi and the Crown and I understand that Te Arawa Lakes Trust have been active in this regard

In respect of Karamu Takina, in particular, we are committed to reaching an agreement with Ngati Kea Tuara so that mana whenua are protected whether or not the reforms are carried through. That would be achieved through direct discussion with Ngati Kea Tuara, and not through the joint committee.

My research to date has indicate that genuine 'mana orite' arrangements rest delicately on relationships of trust between the kawanatanga and rangatiratanga spheres of authority. I am following up after the Taupo workshop to confirm whether Rotorua Lakes is planning to undertake the Council Impact Assessment and to arrange a suitable time. The key objective of the assessment is twofold; to support you in developing a holistic view of the impact that water reform will have on your council – this can then be used to inform elected members; and at an aggregated level it supports an entity B picture that can reflect back to Central Government the collective key priorities, concerns, improvements and opportunities. It uses a balanced scorecard approach to examine all the relevant issues - service and environment, people and supply chain, social and economic well-being as well as finance and funding. The work is funded by LGNZ.

In terms of how the assessment is carried out, we provide you with the content which includes an introduction slide deck, spreadsheet and supporting word document. These documents are distributed to the attendees to familiarise themselves with the content. Attendance is up to you but typically includes the CE and other key leadership staff such as CFO. At the workshop we will work through the questions, scoring each one and gleaning the key issues and priorities. The output will be the completed spreadsheet with a PowerPoint presentation that can be used to support a conversation with the elected members, and we are available to support you in that conversation too as we are with some councils already.

Due to the number of Councils and geographical spread we are hoping to develop an efficient schedule to enable Paul Blair and myself to be in person. At this stage we are looking at a morning session on 26th Aug. From the assessments carried out to date we need to allow 3hrs to give sufficient time to the process.

5. MANAHAUTŪ TE ARAWA HOURUA

5.1 Housing

On 21 July, a meeting with Te Arawa leaders was convened to provide an update on the management of Emergency and Transitional Housing. Council, Kāinga Ora, Ministry for Housing and Urban Development, the Ministry for Social Development and Te Taumata o Ngāti Whakaue Iho Ake all outlined the work being done to ensure fit-for-purpose wrap-around services for families in emergency and temporary housing.

Other related events included the announcement by Ngāti Whakaue of their affordable housing strategy (9 July) and meeting with kaimahi from Te Taumata o Ngāti Whakaue (13 July).

5.2 Three Waters reform

An initial meeting of mana whenua entities was held on 27 July. The meeting was attended by entities that have existing agreements with Council and are directly affected by the proposed Three Waters reforms. It included representatives from Te Puna a Pekehaua trustees, Ngāti Rangiwewehi, Te Arawa Lakes Trust, Te Arawa River Iwi Trust, CNI Iwi Holdings and Raukawa Settlement Trust. We also met with the Haumingi 9B3B trustees to provide an update and seek their involvement.

Discussion points included:

- Concern that entities have developed robust operating relationships with Council, and that the new Entity B may not have similar capability to work effectively with Te Arawa.
- The Government reforms will affect Māori in a range of ways, because they have multiple interests (hapū, land trusts, iwi etc). There was some concern that DIA is seeking to engage with iwi even though Council assets may in fact sit on land owned by particular whānau, hapū and land trusts.
- A recent meeting of all iwi groups within the Entity B rohe was held in Rotorua to discuss the reforms and seek common ground.
- Concern at lack of detail from the Crown and uncertainty created by the proposed reforms.
- The attendees agreed to meet again to determine their representation.

5.2 Matariki

There were a range of Matariki events in Rotorua this year, including an Umu Kohukohu Whetū ceremony on Mokoia Island before first light on 3 July. Council supported social media campaign and the *Matariki Māreikura* speaker series (including guest speakers Dr Aroha Yates-Smith (6 July) and Ngāhuia Te Awekōtuku (8 July)). Te Tatau hosted the launch of a new te reo Māori app in Council chambers (12 July).

In light of this and previous years' activities, TAU developed Matariki 2022 guidelines to assist with Council's preparation for the first official Matariki holiday next year.

5.3 Other key external events through July

Other events included:

- 2 July – Secondary Schools' Kapahaka (Te Whakataetae Kapa Haka Kura Tuarua o Te Arawa) competitions held at Energy Events Centre, with 9 secondary schools competing and tickets fully sold out.
- 6 July – TAU meeting with Scion to present information on local history and history of the land Scion occupies (supporting Ngāpuna hapū)
- 9 July – Council officially opened the Lakefront boardwalk, which was well supported by Ngāti Whakaue and Te Arawa Lakes Trust representatives.
- 14 July – TAU meeting with Te Arawa Lakes Trust regarding archives.
- 19 July – Te Arawa Lakes Trust convened an iwi engagement hui on RMA reforms at Whakarewarewa (19 July).

5. Tūhourangi & Rotorua Lakes Council Action Plan

Joint Action Plan - Rob Pitkethley and Simon Alefosio-Tuck

Rob Pitkethley overviewed the “Tuhourangi and Rotorua Lakes Council Action Plan – 2019-2021” and spoke to a Power Point presentation attached as ‘Attachment 1’.

5.1.1 Lake Tarawera - Rob Pitkethley

- The intention is to develop a shared view of the future of the surroundings of Lake Tarawera and other areas of Tūhourangi interest. This is not specific to Lake Tarawera. This is a shared view for the rohe.
- Have had earlier discussions around taking Council’s 2030 vision and considering how that sits with Tūhourangi’s guiding documents in terms of iwi management plans or environmental management plans. Then formulate a shared view to work on key things together. Perhaps get the influence from Te Arawa 2050 vision as well.
- Suggested to leave this item until more discussions happen around updating the protocol agreement.

Resolved:

To include developing a shared view of the future of the surroundings of Lake Tarawera and other areas of Tūhourangi interest under “Protocol Agreement Update”.

5.1.2 Tarawera Sewage Scheme - Gina Rangi

- Two Cultural Impact Assessments (CIA) have been done on the proposal.
- Sensitive Community Steering Group has been established that included mana whenua, Māori land owners and local residents.
- The preferred option came out from the community steering group was to have connection back in to town following the road. This was unanimously adopted subject to CIA been done.
- In the CIA report there was a request to further investigate the viability of an in- catchment treatment plant. This investigation has been done and the establishment of an in- catchment treatment plant has increased the costing which has to be borne by households.
- Council has written to the local residents asking them to consent to the scheme and Council requires consent from 75% of the residents to proceed with the scheme.
- There is a need to have cultural monitoring when the physical work start and TTA (Tūhourangi Tribal Authority) could resource cultural monitors.

Action Point –

1. Gina to send a summary of the work that is done at Rotoiti in regards to cultural monitoring to TTA to have a discussion.
2. Te Amorangi unit to prepare a briefing paper in regards to what the key risks might be and mechanisms to address those and send to TTA to discuss any make changes as needed.
3. Gina to send the resource consent documents to Deliah.

ATTENDANCE: Watu Mihinui joined the meeting via audio visual link at 9.15am.

5.1.3 Lake Ōkareka upgrades - Rob Pitkethley

- Toilet block in Boyes Beach is operational since mid-2020 and this is by far the top of the line ablution block we have. Have hot and cold running water, charging facilities and other extra facilities. Well appreciated by the locals who use Boyes Beach.
- Received Tourism Infrastructure Fund's support for this and Acacia Rd Boat Ramp upgrade.
- Trailer Inspection point available at Acacia Rd to improve biosecurity.
- There are few adjustments planned to the Acacia road car park, including an accessible parking slot near the ramp and slightly changing the shape of an existing kerb.
- There is a condition on the consent to reflect cultural foundation of the area. Council requires Tūhourangi's help in this space. The history should be portrayed in there.
- Lake Ōkareka Community Association (LOCA), who is leading the work at Lake Ōkareka walkway is planning to fund the walkway extension with the revenue from responsible camping site and other avenues. Needs a resource consent. CIA has been completed.

5.1.4 Waitōharuru (Tarawera Landing) - Rob Pitkethley

- This area needed a major refurbishment and council received MBIE funding since this is a popular visitor site.
- Had to delay the work to understand the complexities under "Lakes A Zone" and has a very limited time window to work on the lake edge and in the water.
- Toilet block upgrade has been completed.
- Improvements in Punaromia was not supported by MBIE so Council and TTA should work together to get alternative funding avenues.

5.1.4 Tarawera Landing café ownership - Rob Pitkethley

- Land has been acquired by the Crown and given to council to manage. Therefore, return process has to go via the Crown. Department of Conservation (DoC) is the main representative for the crown in regards to reserves.
- Council is waiting for a feedback from DoC regarding the process and what needs to be done.
- Gina Rangi gave an update on the process undertaken to date. ie: Minister of Conservations office has been approached advising that a change to the reserves act is required as there's no treaty provision in the reserves act.
- Doc has a treaty clause through its main legislation but still has to follow the Reserves Act process.

Kirikowhai appreciated comments from Council regarding processes and asked for information of process to date. TTA as a treaty partner would like to approach minister to request that process be fast forwarded.

Action Point – Gina to provide information of process to date to Kirikowhai.

The Chair ruled to consider item 6.1 next, which is "Protocol Agreement update" and then to go back to item 5.1.6 - Tokorangi and Whakarewarewa Forest developments.

6. General Business

6.1 Protocol Agreement update - Kirikowhai Mikaere

Kirikowhai Mikaere, expressed the view of TTA as below:-

- There is no requirement to make lots of changes to the existing protocol agreement as it has a strong foundation. Looking at the names of signatories in the existing agreement, it is part of the responsibility to honour this agreement. Since the document is a live document, it can be evolved by tweaking it.
- It will add value if the parties can agree on the definitions around principles - uaratanga, manaakitanga, kaitiakitanga, rangatiratanga.
- Needs to include more areas of interest other than Tarawera.
- TTA feels that there is unfair burden on their side. Being consulted on priorities of work is not mana-ōrite. Therefore, needs to go from a relationship of extraction to a relationship of reciprocity which gives equal explanatory powers.
- Intension of the agreement probably is to give effect to the wairua of Te Tiriti.
- It is required to have mana to mana conversations before mahi to mahi conversations.

Council representatives spoke in support of an update to the protocol agreement.

Geoff Williams and Gina Rangi stated that the council wants to hear TTA's aspirations and that the Council would work together to help them achieve those aspirations.

Action Point – Gina and Kirikowhai to meet and discuss a way forward and set up a committee.

ATTENDANCE: Deliah Balle left the meeting at 10.15 am.

5. Tūhourangi & Rotorua Lakes Council Action Plan

5.1.5 Tokorangi and Whakarewarewa Forest developments

Rob Pitkethley continued to talk to the presentation (Attachment 1)

- Te Pūtaka o Tawa
 - ✓ Car park work is finished.
 - ✓ Commercial opportunities have been initiated and Rotorua Economic Development (RED) has taken a lead role with that.
 - ✓ Commercial development in the site between the two containers has to be worked through with CNI and mana whenua. Meanwhile, a container covered area is being designed for the short-term.
 - ✓ Tūhourangi has been commissioned to do some art work to go on the site.
 - ✓ The Mayor mentioned consideration of an outdoor movie venue.

Rob Pitkethley showed pictures of some of the preliminary sketches of the art work (slide no 9 of the attachment 1) and Watu Mihinui described those images and explained the background to those.

ATTENDANCE: Watu Mihinui left the meeting at 10.27 am.

- Forest Loop
 - ✓ The track is up and running.
 - ✓ Have number of counters which will give the numbers of users etc.
 - ✓ Have been funded by MBIE for "Great Ride Manager" position.
 - ✓ Archeological assessment has been done for track realignment. Waiting to hear from Heritage NZ.
 - ✓ Te Kōtukutuku realignment due to the concerns of the Lake Rotokākahi Board of Control regarding people accessing Lake Rotokākahi (Green Lake).

5.1.7 Papakāinga and other housing - Ngarepo Eparaima

- Infrastructure within Tarawera is limited.
- Want to make sure that there is the opportunity for Tūhourangi people to get back in to the area at some point in time.
- There is a discussion underway regarding a papakāinga near 'buried village'.
- Tūhourangi has yet to formally discuss the matter within themselves and strategize before put things forward.

5.1.8 Tarawera trail and pest control initiatives - Rob Pitkethley

- Spencer road residents have increased their plant and animal pest control work. Main idea is to consider the catchment.
- The Mayor mentioned the possibility of MBIE funding for "Jobs of Nature" to use for Tūhourangi land.

5.1.9 Safer Communities at Whakarewarewa Village – Gina Rangī and Jocelyn Mikaere

- Whakarewarewa Village residents have approached regarding the concerns they have about the safety in the village because of the anti-social behaviour of some people coming from outside to the village.
- Council have a role to play in terms of safety of the community.
- Council informed the community to have a discussion and come back to Council with their ideas to develop a plan. Council could then go to the other partnership agencies (e.g. Police) to get their help to implement the plans.
- Jocelyn informed about the wider safety plans that are being considered by Council at present.
- The Mayor mentioned that the Council to go to other partnership agencies (e.g. Police, Health, MSD) to get their help to implement the plans developed together with communities.

5.1.10 Puarenga Stream - Gina Rangī

- Puarenga Stream Reference group had their first meeting on 2 March 2021. The group reference group has three parties which are Rotorua Lakes Council (RLC), Te Arawa Lakes Trust (TALT) and CNI. They discussed meeting protocols and starting to develop a plan on what the role of the group regarding overseeing the waste water treatment plant upgrade and consenting processes. They will also look in to the main drivers of environmental degradation in Puarenga and whom to partner with to deal with the issues etc.
- The group has commissioned a report from Council's infrastructure team regarding all of the literature that are available in regional council related to Puarenga. Part of the literature review is to include all the CIAs and Iwi information that already exists. This report will help identify the gaps and priorities.
- The reference group requested to arrange a site visit and Council will contact TTA to confirm attendees from TTA. The site visit will be to the new land identified for discharge bed and down the stream to treatment plant.
- TTA is still to hold an iwi and hapū meeting and prepare a position statement.
- TTA will look at the possibility of accessing Te Mana o te Wai Fund.
- Whakarewarewa Primary School was interested in getting involved in cleaning the stream.

6. General Business

6.2 Rates at Hinemihi – Aneta Morgan

- Ben Manley has done some research regarding the titles of the three lands and he is working on understanding exactly what is happening with the lands. Meanwhile, Te Amorangi unit is meeting with Council's rates department to understand what Hinemihi is rated for.

7. Karakia Whakamutunga – Closing Karakia

Ngarepo Eparaima closed the meeting with a Karakia.

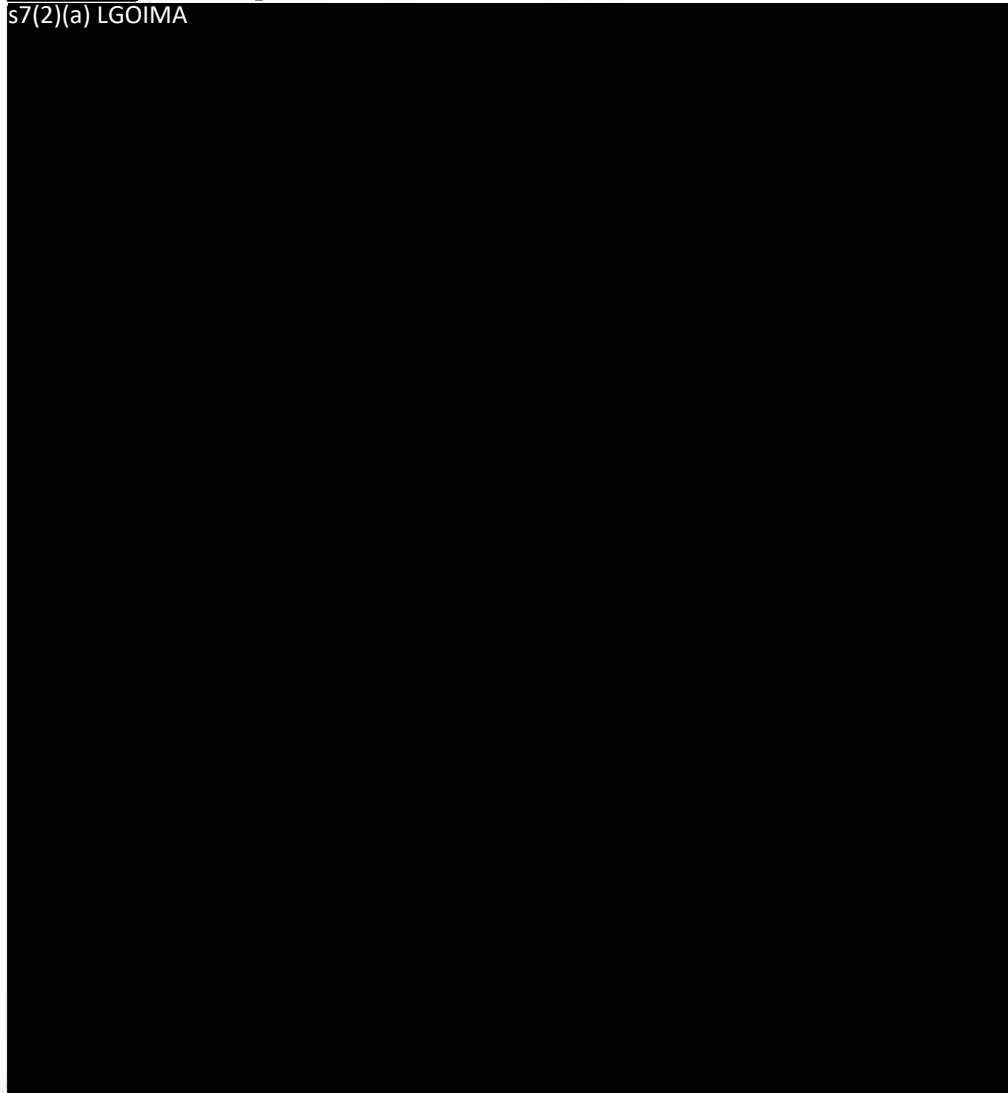

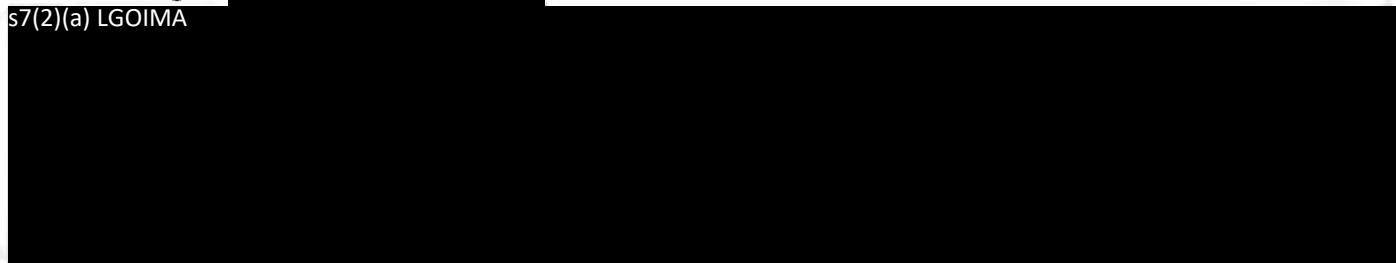

Firstly Nā mātou te Wai - i agree we never ceded our rights or responsibilities.
'Securing' the rights of hapū and iwi for freshwater is paramount. This does mean legal mechanisms are required to enable Rangatiratanga beyond Treaty Settlements and the RMA.

Secondly - The decision making over the shared portion - I.e the water allocated for shared use and community (three waters) and economic benefit (allocation models) needs to be a partnership model.

And finally can we please have a dicussion as hapū and iwi without Council or Mfe present, to discuss how we want to progress the development of the policy for water amongst ourselves.

Council and Mfe have resources for iwi to engage in these discussions. I suggest we propose a Te Arawa water hui where we get to workshop these issues with the objective of providing hapū and iwi the opportunity of exploring these issues so we can collectively or individually develop and present options back to Council and the Crown.


The Three waters hui was a successful meeting for this, and if we can replicate that for NPSFM and RM reform it may help us moving forward.

Some of you may not know me. My name is s7(2)(a) Ngatai from Ngapuna and I've been to a couple of these hui. I wanted to raise an issue before tomorrow's hui in light of newly raised concerns.

My concern for all of this is the 50 / 50 Co-Governance model.

I'm a part of Rotorua District Residents and Ratepayers chaired by Cr Reynold Macpherson and I got into a healthy debate about 50 / 50. The belief shared by so many that there was no statement of Co-Governance or partnership in the Treaty of Waitangi (ToW) - the Treaty Myth. This was relevant to 3 waters and the Representation Review - which I voted option 3.

However upon reviewing their reference material - ToW, alongside the June 2021 3 waters proposal I saw an issue.

Maori governs Maori affairs including Water and Land. By adopting 50 / 50 Maori are giving 50% of the say to General in Maori affairs. Politically speaking that's the most democratic approach, however considering the push from democracy 7 vs 3 on Council, doesn't truly reflect the implications of this type of governance.

My concern being the ramifications of 50% say on Maori affairs. When looking at purely Land and Water as assets - which sits with Local, predominantly we have seen a good range of Maori reps on Council to protect those interests. However the RMA reform and at the last hui, it spoke about Maori having more say - under 50 / 50? But Maori have 100% say when it comes to Land, Water and Maori people. This is what ToW guaranteed. What's stopping Maori from hocking the 3 waters idea and implementing it independently? 50 / 50 is already shunned by a good percentage. So why are Maori still giving of democracy when NZers aren't accepting this magnitude of governance from Maori?

What's protecting the interest of Water and Land as a Taonga by giving 50% governance to the Crown who views it as an asset. Like any asset can be sold or liquidated. What are the implications on Maori people?

Im opposed to 50 / 50 until im sure that the interest of Maori affairs are still protected. Im for the RMA reform as it strengthens Maoris ability to make industry incl Govt more accountable for NZ wellbeing.

Im for 3 waters as I saw value in the way it was to be managed. Limits, accountability and overall better management. Projected cost is good in the long run. I noticed a large population of NZ has contaminated water so we do need to clean this up. Also opportunity for Maori to get into infrastructure as service providers. 100% Governance? Can we do a better job 😊

Please correct me on anything, these are my observations and understandings.

5. RLC (Rotorua Lakes Council) Project update

Stavros Michael (DCE – Environmental & Infrastructure Solutions) gave a brief of his role and introduced Regan Fraser (Infrastructure Manager), then continued to speak to a powerpoint presentation titled “Three Waters Reform Proposed”. (Attachment 1)

Since the Havelock North contamination issue, Government identified a number of concerns, highlighted in the Presentation.

Stavros Michael advised that he is a member of two steering groups working with the government to evaluate and assess the Three waters reform options.

1. A national group led by the Department of Internal Affairs

Focused on evaluating the current condition and challenges faced by the three waters infrastructure across all Territorial Local Authorities. The steering group exchanges technical views about asset management practice, long term investment required to meet new performance standards and regulations, and to ensure that the communities’ levels of service are protected. Another element of this Group’s workings relates to establishing appropriate involvement of Iwi in these reforms and how mana whenua views and cultural

objectives are taken into consideration in the future strategies and networks management of the Three Waters.

2. A Regional Steering Group

Assisted by Local Government NZ and it covers some 16 TLAs in the Waikato and the Bay of Plenty region. This group is focussed on exploring the option of a regional water entity set up in collaboration with all the 16 TLAs and the Government. To provide a good basis for forming a proposal to be considered by all the 16 communities the group has undertaken a stocktake of the current services and the future demand taking into consideration growth and environmental improvement expectations. In the near future the Group will explore options for governance and community participation into such proposal especially from the perspective of ensuring protection of the local identities and the unique characters of those communities and their partnerships with Iwi and Hapu. RLC has a strong view that such entity must demonstrate readiness to take their direction from local communities and to work closely and in partnership to give effect to the Te Arawa 2050 vision.

Further discussion took place around the reform and TARITS position. TARIT supported the establishment of the waters services regulator and the need for a reform.

Eugene Berryman-Kamp spoke further about TARITS submission to the Bill and outlined the following:

- That Crown retains its obligations to hapu and iwi to uphold the treaty.
- Major concerns for our smaller hapu, how do they compete against the major players
- Recommend that Clause 56 be amended to provide for specific exemptions for Marae & Papakainga to be included in the definition of domestic self-supply
- Support the implementation of Local and Regional water bodies overseeing the decisions rather than National

Action: Eugene Berryman-Kamp to provide a copy of TARIT's submission to Gina Rangi to share with the team.

Stavros Michael reminded all about the good examples here in Rotorua:

Agreement with Ngāti Rangiwewehi.

RLC's approach is, yes there is a need to provide water supply to the community, but there are also cultural, manawhenua and iwi expectation. We are co-owners of the resource consent, working together to co-manage drinking water from their stream. This is unique and doesn't happen in many places. It's important not to lose the gains and the advantages of this kind of approach.

Most government and local councils say, it's spring water, we need it, end of story.

Geoff Williams gave a summary of his opinion with the concern that when it comes to being prioritized we could end up near the bottom of the list, similar to our Rooding priorities at the moment. Ie: The big places like Tauranga & Hamilton with major water challenges will take priority.

Eugene Berryman-Kamp noted that TARIT work in partnership with t Waikato River Iwi, Tuwharetoa, Te Arawa, Raukawa, Tainui, Ngati Maniapoto & I also attend River Iwi managers meeting in Taupo. Although we've forwarded our submission I haven't appreciated the power of submitting a combined submission until this meeting.

Peri Marks made comment to co-management being an equal share between both parties.

Gina Rangī expressed her concerns with the proposal form noting that the crown has a very narrow view of what iwi interests are. Iwi have many difference interests in many different roles as mana whenua. Current legislation is not providing for those different roles and different hats that we wear. If legislation doesn't provide for it, then its doubtful that the crown will have an understanding of the multitude of interests when it comes to the three waters.

In this district we have been on a programme of increasing services to smaller communities, working with mana whenua, where we can.

Under these reforms those assets will transfer to other bodies, and that relationship will come to an end. It could mean a lack of access of services for small rural communities. We need to work together on trying to build on a very strong case and claim our territory in this space.

Further discussion took place about TARIT members and connections with other National groups ie: Fresh water iwi leaders technical advisory group, TALT, Waikato River iwi etc.

Deliah Balle - Iwi are under resourced and have to spread themselves to ensure that the values are heard so the reductionist approach doesn't work for iwi. The Te Arawa partnership with RLC is an example where engagement doesn't become a tick box exercise, we're actually working.

Further discussion took place around Te Ao Māori view.

Mayor Chadwick: Rather than sit and wait for reforms to overwhelm us we need to get on and develop a model that matters and is significant to us/Te Arawa. We're currently stretched trying to respond to co-governance groups so this would be a space to get moving.

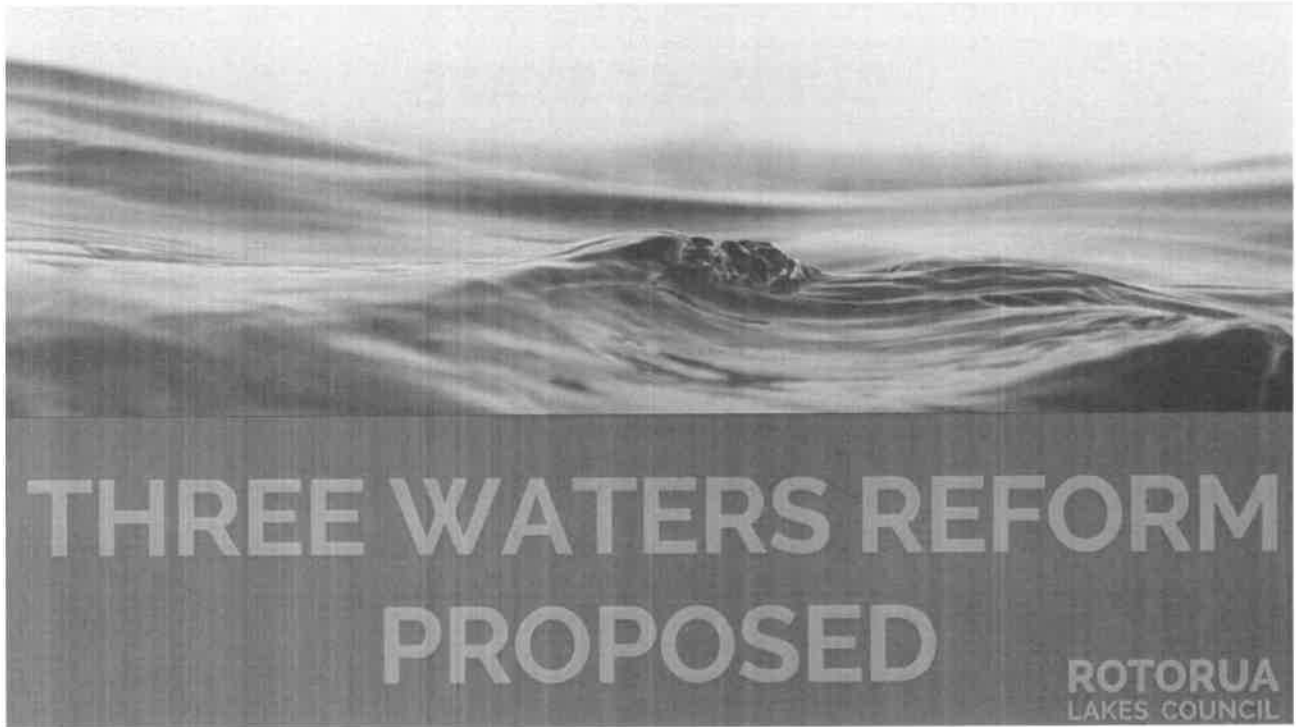

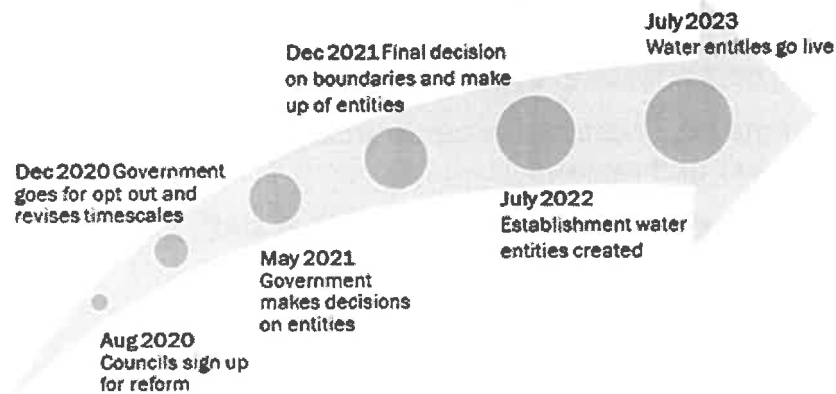

5. SHARED PROJECTS UPDATES

5.1 Progress Report on the Te Waro Uri (Taniwha Springs) water take for the Ngongotaha Municipal water supply.

Resolved

That the report “Progress Report on the Te Waro Uri(Taniwha Springs) Water take for the Ngongotaha Municipal Water Supply” be received

Greg Manzano spoke to his report and gave the following update:

Water take resource consent:

A final meeting held for BOPRC Monday 24th May where the final draft resource consent with conditions will be presented to the working group.

When agreements to conditions from working party have been finalised consent will be returned to BOPRC for approval.

Construction consent:

Currently in process, expect final draft of the consent conditions in 2 weeks time.

A consultant has been commissioned to proceed with a detailed design. Aiming for completion and report by end of September.

Waiting on approval of consents is the hold up at the moment.

Gina Rangi: - First time in NZ a Council has had a joint consent with Mana whenua.

Normally Mana whenua views are taken into account, and ultimately Council hold the consent and makes the key decisions. Under this process its; jointly held with the Puna trustees.

It is a significant step for Council and mana whenua because it involves power-sharing.

Stavros Michael: - Reiterated the unique approach taken ie: the joint consent, the joint co-governance, the joint operations management plan for this facility. A significant amount of work has been undertaken between our team of technical advisors and Ngāti Rangiwewehi senior representatives.

The outcome is a joint consensus on managing and protecting the puna and impact on the

Awahou, how the puna should look, best options to preserve its mauri, its presentation, future provisions etc.

A mutually pleasing result from all perspectives achieving, good technical outcomes, regulatory outcomes and also inter-relationships outcomes which are significant, and will lead us into the upcoming 3 waters challenge.

The Mayor requested that this incredible story of our journey be noted.

Further discussion took place around the table acknowledging the following:

- The work led by the Trust and RLC working group
- Congratulating those who paved the way for this working relationship including those no longer with us.
- That this hasn't been a smooth journey to reach this equal partnership.
- Ngāti Rangiwewehi never gave up, and here we are 25 years later
- Within this partnership it's not about looking after our commodity, it's about looking after our taonga, "ko te wairua ki te tangata".

Waiata "Huia" from Ngāti Rangiwewehi followed the korero from Anaru.

ATTENDANCE: Gina Mohi joined the Hui at 10.38am.

The Mayor directed that the item from Stavros Michael on "The 3 Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water & Storm Water)" be the next item on the Agenda.

5.2 The 3 Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water & Storm Water)

Stavros Michael spoke to PowerPoint titled "Three Waters Reform Proposed" – **(Attachment 1)**

The key question is which parties will be affected by this reform. Careful attention is required on how these reforms are proposed and impact on mana whenua and Rotorua.

Mr Williams note the following points noted:

- Rotorua falls in a region including Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Taranaki and central North Island.
- We're small when you look at the scale of the region
- How responsive will that entity be to the things that are important to us?
- Approx. 30 to 40% of councils across the country are currently not willing to be part of this.
- A big concern is the pace of change.
- Council need to make a critical decision later this year on whether to support the reform
- Don't believe Council can make that decision alone – needs to be shared with Mana whenua affected by the reforms.
- It's not just community, council decision is pivotal to Te Arawa
- In my view discussions are required between government, Te Arawa, Ngāti Rangiwewehi and Council, around how important local control and decision making is to us.

Mr Williams made the following statement:

Today's protocol meeting is a good first opportunity to table this. It's an opportunity for Council and Mana whenua to consider setting up a Co-governance forum to make this very important decision.

This is a legacy decision, which will affect future generations. The impact of the decision means we need to make the decision in a different way.

Further discussion on the 3 waters reform continued with the following points noted.

- Local decision making is paramount.
- The Crown are not currently engaging adequately with iwi on this kaupapa, despite many requests and attempts.
- It's a consultation approach, rather than a partnership approach.
- If this continues to progress ahead of the rights and interests conversation then there is significant litigation risk .
- Being part of the wider solution is really important for both RLC and mana Whenua.
- If there's going to be a true partnership it needs to be represented on both sides of the table.
- This discussion requires prioritising. Also do we invite the Crown to have a conversation with us directly as a community, (Ngāti Rangiwewehi and council) on this kaupapa.

5.3 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU)

The Chair commented on the value of discussions at our MOU but there's not enough urgency at this forum.

It was noted that at a previous meeting an agenda item to review the MOU was raised. Ngāti Rangiwewehi are ready to move to the next level.

Action: The Mayor asked for the MOU to be reviewed.

Gina Mohi - provided feedback from a recent meeting held at the Holiday Inn, regarding this reform.

- We were informed assets will stay in Councils hand, but management was moving over.
- These assets "going to someone else to manage" are our intergenerational investments.
- Who is "Te Taumata Arowai" accountable too?
- There will be iwi around the motu, who will just go No. Others will say we want to say no, but if we have to agree, then here's the mitigation.

Further discussion took place around tomorrow's meeting regarding Māori wards, Te Tiriti and the concerns regarding the reform process.

5.4 Housing – Emergency update

Rosemary Viskovic - spoke to powerpoint titled “He Papakāinga, He Hāpori Taurikura”
(Attachment 2)

Powerpoint highlighted the following

- Strategy Development timeline
- Vision
- Work Streams (Reminder: its not a Council strategy, there are many players who are part of this.)
- Emergency Housing Taskforce

The Chair added the following comments

- We’ve got the attention of government to address safe, suitable emergency housing for families and children.
- It’s a first to have a task force set up in a Council building, and to be working alongside iwi to find a way forward.
- But we’re not there yet.

Further discussion took place around Papakāinga and its challenges:

The following noted

- Structure planning – Who from Kāinga Ora should come talk to iwi?
- There’s a need to avoid adhoc planning on Māori land
- Infrastructure – The process for whānau to build on whenua is arduous

Request to Council

There’s a need for navigation in this area.

6. **NGĀTI RANGIWEWEHI PROJECTS UPDATES**

Tirohanga Whānui – Te Rangikāheke Bidois gave an overview **(Attachment 3)**

- Intergenerational succession is extremely important
- Statistics (Taunga)
- There are 2 Rangiwewehi marae
- Iwi Relationships - A reinforcement of iwi relationships in place.

2040 Vision and progress

Anaru spoke to this slide and gave an explanation of Rangiwewehi Tū Tapatahi

Refer to the powerpoint for the many projects underway.

Te Rangikāheke provided an overview

“Te Mana o te Wai”

Gina Mohi gave an overview of progress

Te Kaikaitahuna Management Co (TKM)

The directors and trustees were introduced

Te Rangikāheke - continued with an update on TKM current activities & Long Term Aspirations.

Discussion took place around developing a Motor-home self-sustained camping facility. It was suggested Ngāti Rangiwewehi meet Rob Pitkethley for more information around this.

Action: - Gina to discuss with Rob Pitkethley.

The Mayor also suggested a discussion with Rotorua Economic Development (Andrew Wilson), as they are aware of funds available to assist the development of sustainable tourism.

Te Tāhūhū o Tawakeheimoa Trust – update

Ngāti Rangiwewehi have been in discussions with DOC basically asking them to honour their statutory commitments.

Discussion took place around requirements to assist with Papakāinga.

Ngāti Rangiwewehi noted desire to build papakāinga. They acknowledged that good planning is a must, a navigator would be helpful.

Someone to lead the process, and work with our land trusts to facilitate the planning and the construction.

Challenge for Ngāti Rangiwewehi at the moment is the revitalisation of the trust structure.

Stavros Michael advised that when Ngāti Rangiwewehi, the trusts are ready RLC are here to help.

7. General Business

Traffic safety is becoming an issue at the Marae entrance roadway and a suggestion was to place judder bars at either end of the road.

Grateful to have Playground moved to a safer place which RLC were part of.

Action - The Chair suggested holding discussion with Stavros Michael.

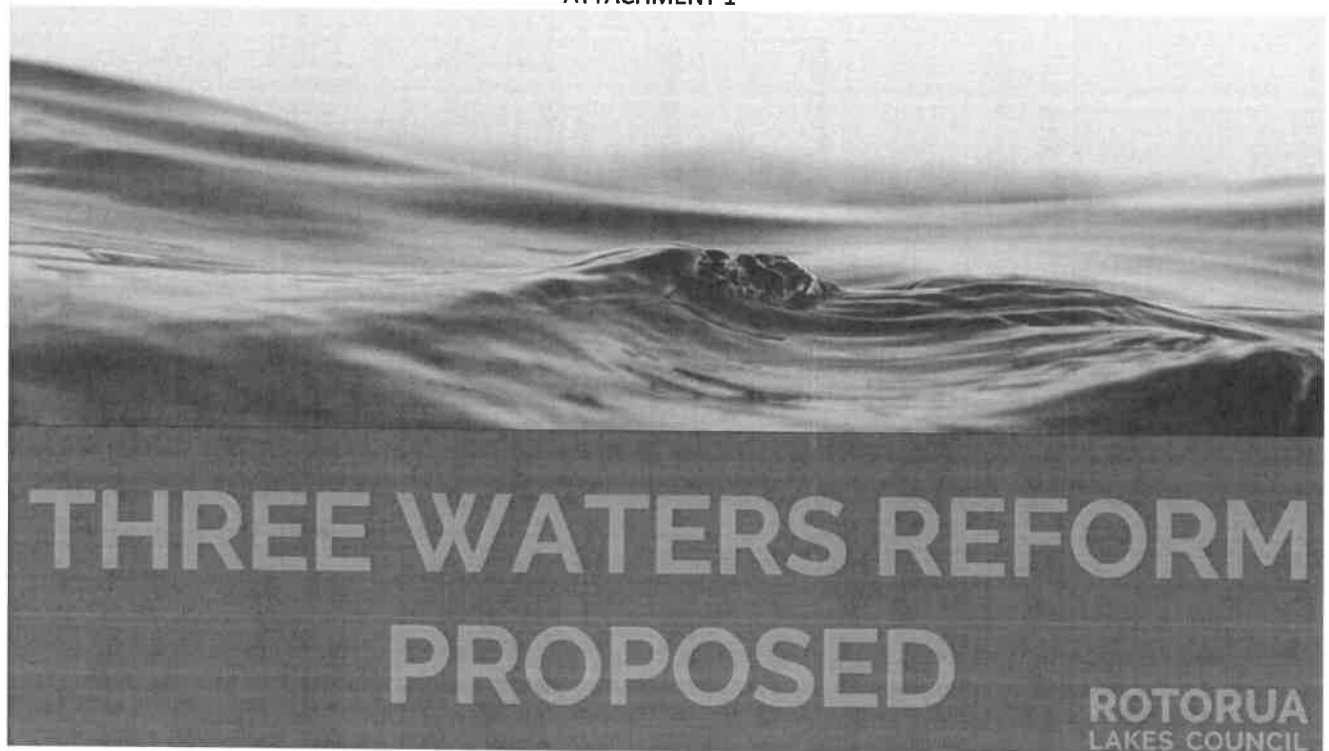

 - Transfer 3 Water infrastructure from councils to the new entities
 - Councils will no longer own and operate 3 Water infrastructure



THE TIMELINE AND DECISION POINTS



A POSSIBLE WAIKATO/BOP ENTITY WOULD LOOK LIKE

- \$7 Billion assets
- Requires \$4 billion for capacity/growth/compliance (LTPs)
- Historic legacy of underfunding (approx. \$1.7 Billion)

Not clear at this stage what this would mean for the relationship of Councils, Ngāti Rangiwewehi with each other, and with the new entities

 - NR Protocol / co-management options
 - Te Arawa Partnership
 - Local concerns/values/priorities/identities

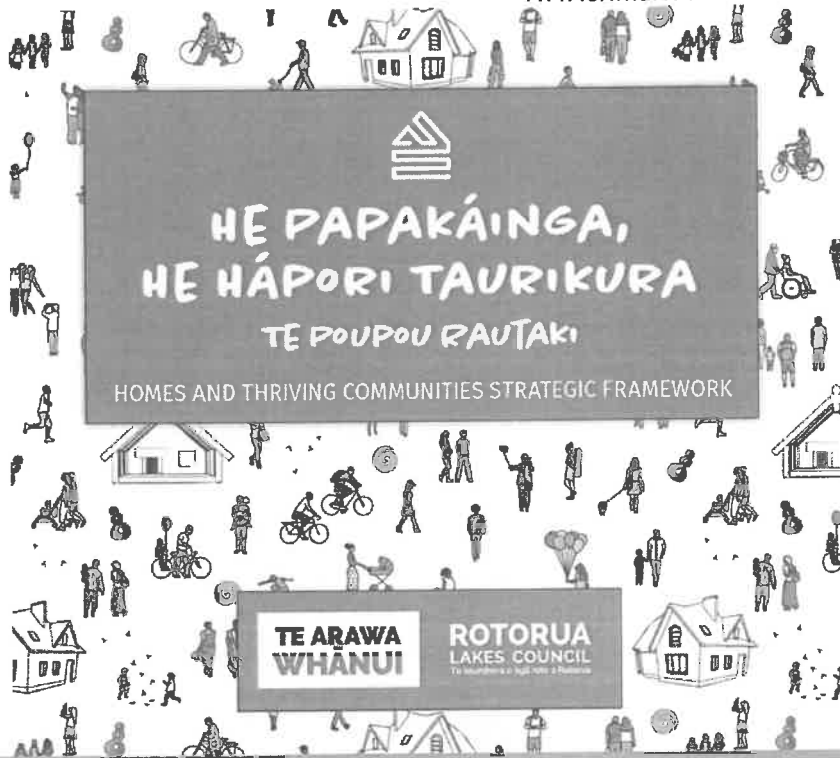

Next steps

- Mana whenua partners (including TALT, Te Puna a Pekehau trustees and Ngāti Rangiwewehi and RLC should work to ensure the reforms:
 - New entities must give effect to iwi/community **values and priorities** (recognizing a place-based approach not a utility-based approach).
 - **Services** from the new entities must meet or exceed the current standard of services
 - Regular performance reporting and accountability to Councils and iwi partners

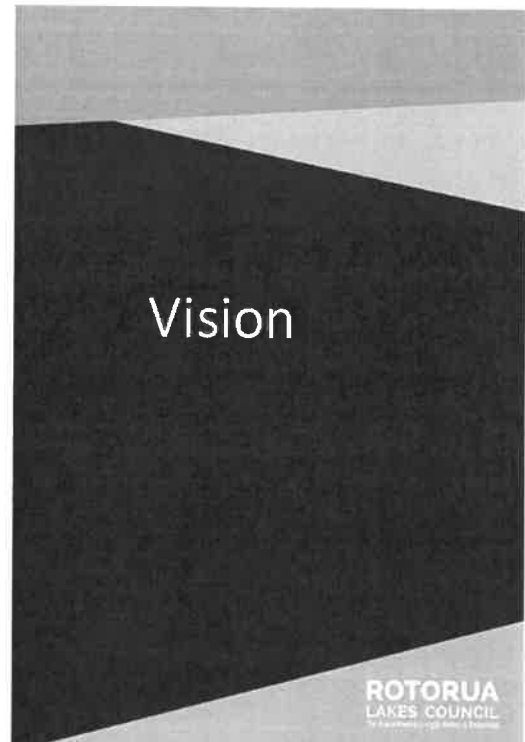
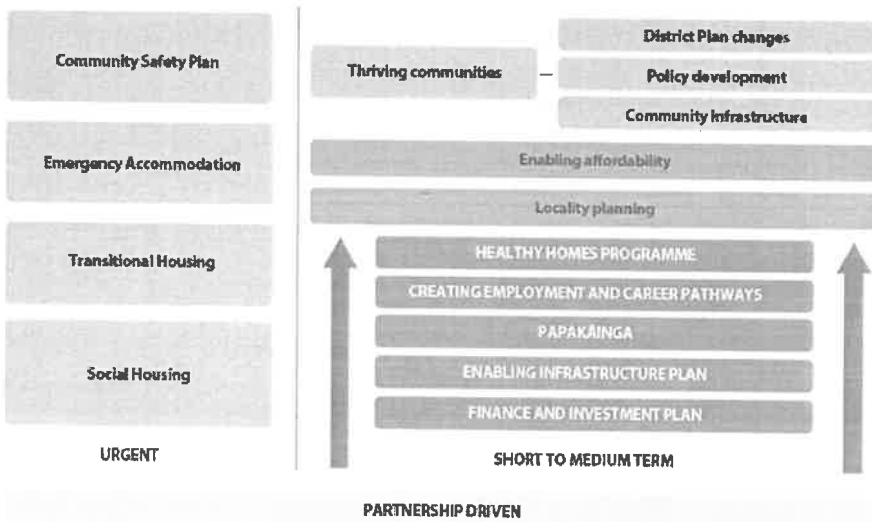
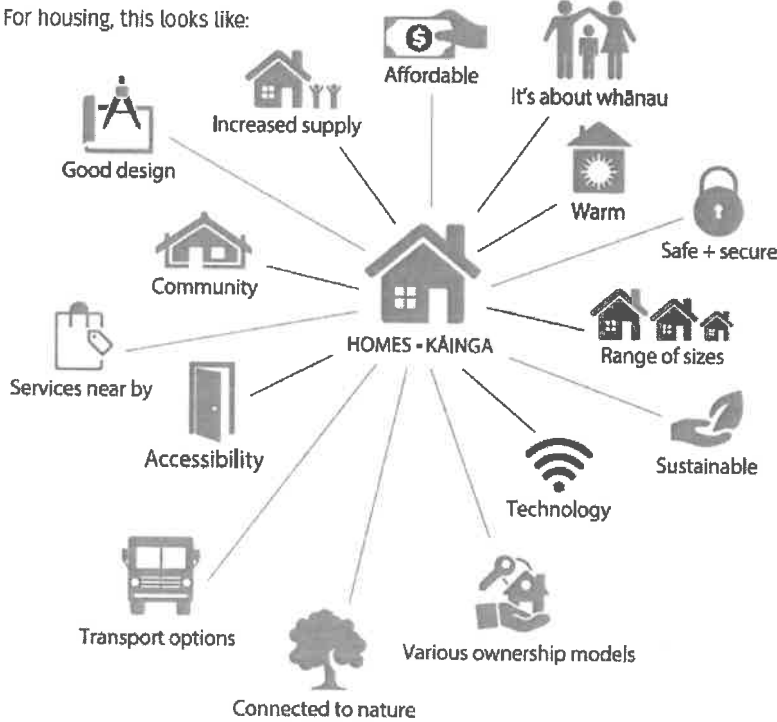

- Housing Data Review September 2016
- Spatial Plan draft 2017, adoption 2018
- Oct-Dec 2019 initial engagement to inform housing strategy development
- Work with Ministry of Housing and Urban Development and other partners
- Establishment Leadership Group
- Feb 2020 Minister for Housing confirms Rotorua priority for place-based approach
- June 2020 Draft Strategic Framework public engagement, closed 14 August
- September 2020 strategy completed

For housing, this looks like:



Emergency Housing Taskforce

- Concern about continued high level of need for emergency housing and the negative effects of this on all
- Cross-government taskforce identified and recommended urgent changes required including:
 - Government to directly contract motels for emergency accommodation
 - Wrap around social support services for those in emergency accommodation to be provided
 - Grouping of cohorts like families and tamariki in particular motels separate from other groups
 - One-stop Housing Hub for access to services and support to be established
- Ministerial approval, range of staff now working to implement recommendations
