1. KARAKIA WHAKAPUAKI – OPENING KARAKIA

3. TE WHAKAŪ I NGĀ MENETI – CONFIRMATION OF MINTUES

Te Rangikaheke Bidois gave verbal update on Ngāti Rangiwewehi progress. Highlights include

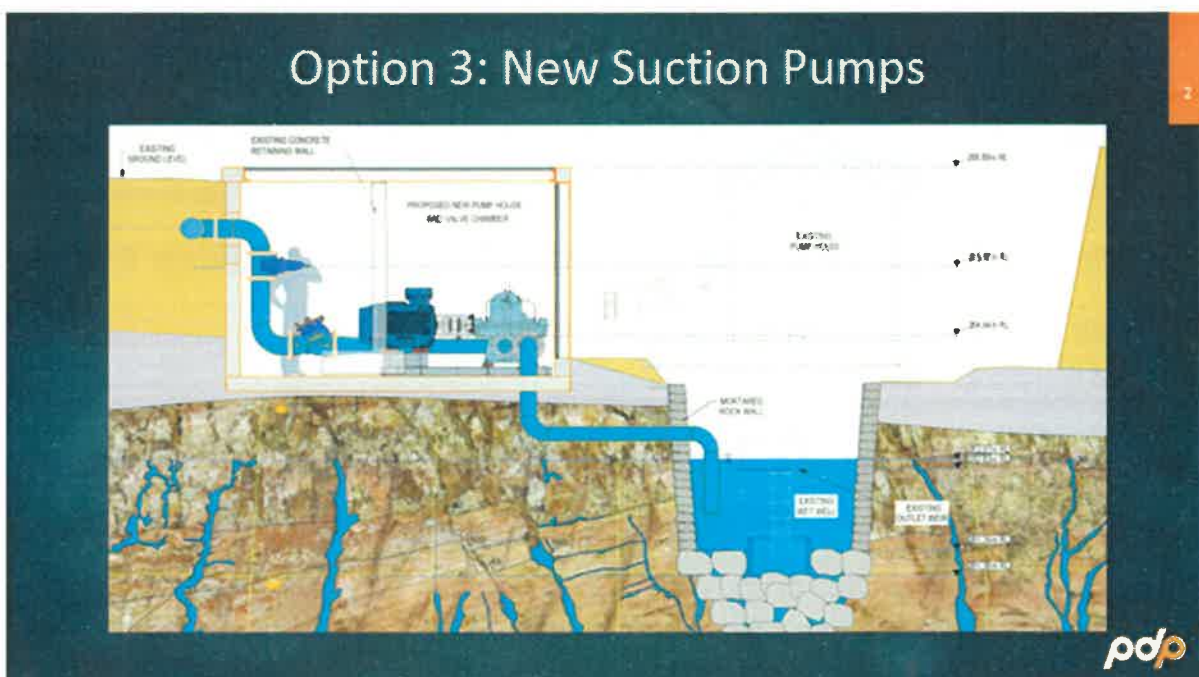
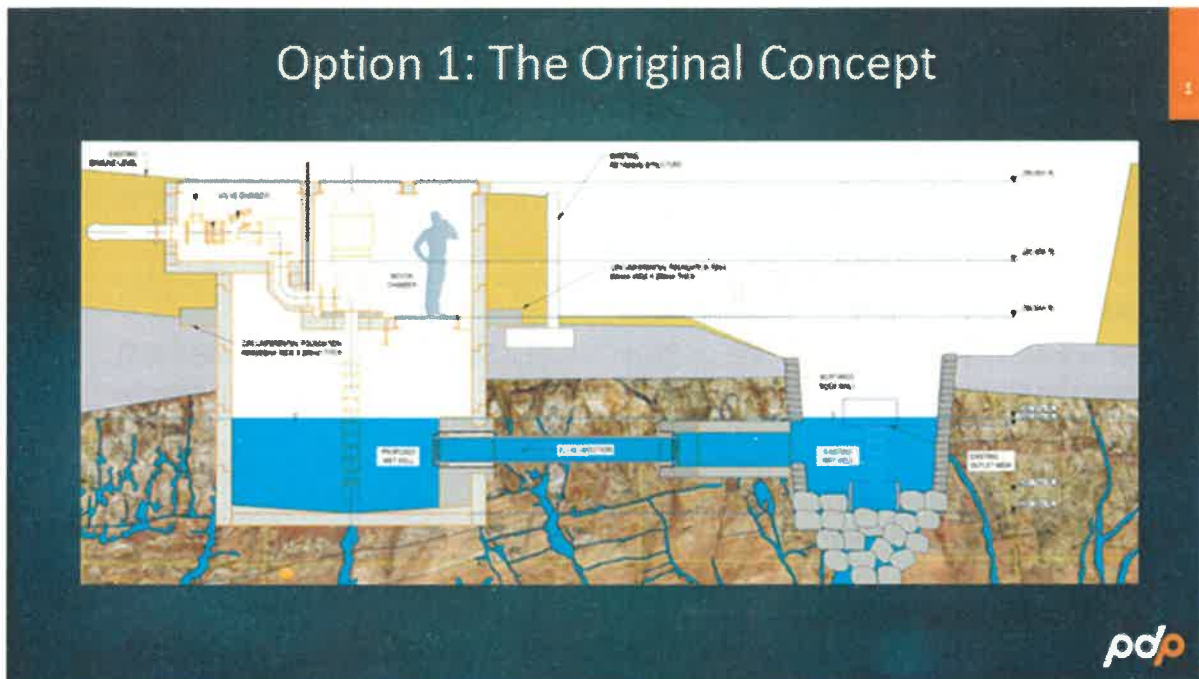
- increased Rangatahi numbers becoming involved.
- RLC Building staff and their positive contribution towards building progress.
- Actively involved with the progress of the tracks around the Lake.

4. Projects update

Taniwha Springs:

Greg Manzano gave an update on the joint application between Ngāti Rangiwewehi and RLC. New experience for RLC and BOPRC as 1st ever joint application. Application is for the next 25 years. Currently waiting for Cultural Impact Assessment (CIA) to be finalised, which is additional information to the application.

Greg continued to talk to the following slides: - Now looking a Suction pump (Option 3). This will reduce risk of damage to existing spring by Excavating (Option 1)



Once the CIA is submitted it may only be another 6 months max before the Resource consent is granted.

Working through this project together has increased the understanding from both parties, about how decisions are made.

The confidence in this joint relationship has definitely improved. It's amazing what can be achieved when Council work in partnership with communities.

Hamurana Water Supply

The consent will expire 1 October 2026. Given the amount of work done for this application, we're looking at scoping work early next year and start working with Ngāti Rangiwewehi for renewal of application.

Kaitiaki Flows

Greg stated that its about taking into consideration Cultural images/aspirations of the Iwi and translating this into hard numbers which was challenging from an engineer's point of view.

With GNS & Ngāti Rangiwewehi working together a number was agreed too. The amount of flow that's allowed from the stream at a certain monitoring point.

In terms of supplying the Ngongotaha area there's no problem, but in an emergency there could be some issues.

5. PC3 update (Significant Natural Areas)

Kate Dahm spoke to a powerpoint titled "update on Plan Change 3 Significant Natural Areas (PC3)" Reminded all about the Korero from Kim Smith at previous meeting. Update is outlined in attached powerpoint. (Attachment 1)

6. BOPRC PC9 update (Region-wide water quantity)

Kate continued to speak to a powerpoint titled "update on BOPRC plan change Region-Wide Water Quantity (PC9)" (Attachment 2)

Te Rangikaheke Bidois talked about Group 1 which consists of

- Tauranga Moana
- Motiti Island
- Ngāti Awa
- Ngāti Pikiao (environmental society)
- Ngāti Makino
- Ngāti Rangiwewehi

RLC have been helpful with appeal processes and have assigned a planner to work with (Group 1)

Te Rangikaheke gave update on their appeal process around PC9.

Reminded all that Pre mediation is a very long process.

Further discussion took place around municipal water supplies.

7. PC10 update - BOPRC Proposed Plan Change 10

Gina Rangi - No further update on PC10 – Hearings closed in June – No response back from court yet.

Wastewater treatment plant update

- Application for resource consent referred to environmental court.
- RLC asked the courts for time to engage with submitters who are opposing the application.
- Requests for time extensions to allow discussions to continue have been submitted to the courts.
- Potential hearings with mediation may be required if no progress is being made.

On behalf of Ngāti Rangiwewehi Michael Hancock advised the following:

- Ngāti Rangiwewehi charitable trust wananga are planned to keep iwi updated with the status of the wastewater treatment plant.
- It's public knowledge that a water resource consent has been secured for commercial purposes.
- This process started back in 2015 and is a good example of the benefits of early engagement. It's allowed time to bring our people along and give them a good understand through Kaitiaki flows how we can make this work both commercially and economically, but also within our own cultural and environmental parameters
- A framework outlining iwi aspirations has been developed and now requires a long term partner who is capable and has a proposal that aligns with aspirations identified in this framework.

8. General Business

Cr Donaldson advised that today's korero has given an insight into how much work and pressure iwi committees are under.

For staff this is a big learning curve. They have a better appreciation and understanding about the time required for these projects. Early engagement doesn't necessarily mean an earlier decision, but it does give you more time to have those discussions with the community.

Projects tend to take longer, but the intention is that the outcome is more robust and more widely supported.

The Mayor asked about the possibility of Papakainga in the future.

Discussion took place around the challenges. Support would be required for this type of project at Awahou Village.

Anaru Bidois acknowledged the worth of these meetings and made comment to the following:

- The living history of our awa. Each generation has their own world view of the awa.
- The history of our whenua.
- GNS mapping has given iwi a point of reference. The science can be used to reconnect.
- Reference was made to legislation and the protection of shared Taonga.
- Acknowledged Council and the current MOU. The MOU is not about projects it's about the people that are going to be here forever. It's about having our people here, like Michael. We need to look at our succession plan to keep more of our people here.

Cr Raukawa-Tait remarked on how inspiring the korero today would have been for our prospective Councillors to listen too and to understand the value of relationships that can develop.

She talked about a Housing project that Dennis O'Reilly was part of in Hawkes bay.

They didn't have the skills or energy, but with housing as the end objective they used a 4 year time frame to develop the skills required to lift the project from the drawing board to reality.

They involved the people who needed the housing and advised them that it was not going to be a quick fix. In the end, the families themselves identified the priority families that needed housing.

The people that developed the skills during that 4-year period are now leaders not only in the housing projects but also in other areas of health and education.

An enlightening way to not only look at various projects to help iwi develop but also looking at people development at the same time. What they've learnt they're prepared to share.

Gina reminded all about the upcoming Te Tatau o Te Arawa Elections and encouraged members to stand. Nominations close next week. Copy of Elections timetable distributed (Attachment 3).

➤ **Hamurana Springs Water Supply Resource Consent**

- Current watertake consent will expire 1 October 2026
- Consented limit 3,200m³/day
- Exceeded limits on 25 November, 26 November and 27 November by approx. 25-50m³
- Leak detection and water conservation advertisements undertaken
- No further exceedance
- BoPRC and NR were informed
- Investigating options to avoid similar situation next summer

4. IWI PRESENTATIONS Strategy, Vision & Kaupapa

Ngāti Rangiwewehi members spoke to “Ngāti Rangiwewehi” Powerpoint presentation (Attachment 1)

4.1 Member update

Kerri Anne Hancock – Trustee (Rangiwewehi Charitable Trust)

Michael Hancock is the Director Chair of “Te Kaikaitahuna Management Company Ltd”

Patariki Clark - Implementation Ranger

Nicola (Nikki) Douglas, Vinnie Brown & Cr Maxwell trustees on PSGE Te Tahuhu o Tawakeheimoa Trust

4.2 Iwi Relationships (Slide 6)

As part of the Te Roopu Hauora o Te Arawa (Slide 6) it was noted that there were many families with no connectivity.

The Mayor suggested this task could be approached jointly

4.3 National Policy Statement for Fresh water management.

Further discussion took place regarding Regional Council.

Nikki Douglas commented on the National Policy Statement and suggested that at a Strategic Level a conversation be held between Ngāti Rangiwewehi and RLC, to look at how this can be taken to a Regional Policy conversation moving forward.

4.4 Implementation Ranger

Patariki Clark - Highlighted the uniqueness of his role with Ngāti Rangiwewehi.

Works specifically for Ngāti Rangiwewehi whereas his colleagues around the country work for iwi collectives.

Talked further around the RMP (Reserves Management Plan), CMP (Cultural Materials Plan) and Ngāti Rangiwewehi's Environmental Plan. (Slide 15)

- 5 reserves returned to Ngāti Rangiwewehi (Slide 16)

Doesn't capture all the reserves from Mokoia to Maketu that Ngāti Rangiwewehi have an interest in within DOC.

Significance is it includes Tawakeheimoa forest where there are major based employment opportunities.

Discussions currently underway on how Ngāti Rangiwewehi can leverage off this.

There are 1400 Hectares within Tawakeheimoa forest.

- Part of the treaty settlement - Ngāti Rangiwewehi is in collaboration with Tapuika building a nursery.
- Iwi need to be recognised as a partner not a stakeholder or a community group.
- Iwi sit alongside the department of conservation.

The Mayor asked Patariki if he had aspirations to share this more widely with Te Arawa and through the Lakes Trust.

Patariki replied that 3 years in this role is not enough time to achieve all aspirations.

Making connections to obtain a cohesive plan that embraces all of the iwi of Te Arawa would be a medium to long term plan.

The opportunity for collaboration and partnerships are important for Ngāti Rangiwewehi to progress to meet their vision and aspirations.

Primary focus right now is establishing Ngāti Rangiwewehi and the platform that they work from.

This could become a model to work from with other iwi.

4.5 Hamuarana Springs – Te Arawa Wai Warriors

This is a programme engaging the youth and giving them an understanding and Kaitiakitanga about fresh water. If launched and successful, rangatahi will undertake a monitoring programme of a Koaro at Hamurana. There are other sites designated throughout the Te Arawa rohe that the Te Arawa Wai Warriors plan to monitor.

4.6 Iwi environmental management plan

Kerriann Hancock- Plan which was drafted in 2012 and updated in 2014. Currently looking at updating and future proofing it. (Slide 18)

How do we utilise the spatial plan to help us be proactive, and engage with the likes of Councils, planners etc. Ngāti Rangiwewehi's own spatial plan would be a key tool to improve engagement.

The Mayor and CE made comment to this proactive decision and confirmed that RLC assist where they can.

4.7 Housing Strategy

Gina Rangi- The Housing Strategy is out for consultation. Developed by a combination of Council and Te Arawa principally, but also input from Kainga ora and other essential government agencies. There is direction around housing for the west side and potential plans and we require the communities thoughts/suggestions. We have a hui a iwi consultation tentatively scheduled for the 28 of this month. Invitations will be sent once confirmed.

The housing strategy is not just about building housing, its about education ie: Where are schools going to be, transport, infrastructure, water supply and papakainga.

Invitations to Hui a Iwi Consultation to be sent to Te Rangikaheke once date is confirmed.

The Mayor asked that an agreement to assist Ngāti Rangiwewehi with Spatial plan be noted.

4.8 Te Maru o Kaituna Representatives

Kerriann Hancock and Vinnie Brown are the Ngāti Rangiwewehi representatives. Acknowledged Ben for securing the Co-Governance arrangement. Action plan was developed last year. There is potential for Ngāti Rangiwewehi to lead some work around, our connection, cultural materials use, recreating our journey/connection back to the coast. Looking at making application for funding and would appreciate the active support of Council on any application we make and identify how we might work together delivering our joint aspirations around the Kaituna.

4.9 Hamurana Water Supply

Te Rangikaheke - A request to re-invigorate our desire for the return of the land from DOC and also the implementation of Kaitiaki flows over Hamurana as part of that.

Infrastructure to consider how RLC can provide for Kaitiaki flows at Hamurana

Apologies RMP(Reserve Management Plan) not available to table today.

5. RLC Projects update

5.1 Joint resource consent; Storm water consent; Hamurana springs water supply resource consent

Greg Manzano (RLC infrastructure planning manager) spoke to powerpoint presentation (Attachment 2).

Reviewed the Journey RLC & Ngāti Rangiwewehi have had to date and covered the points highlighted in presentation.

Te Rangikaheke advised that a proposal will be put forward inviting Kerriann Hancock & Nicola Douglas to join the consenting team. Key reason is part of the succession planning.

Gregg advised that due to time frame this would have to be done asap.

Confirmation of meeting required asap so a timeline can be established.

Mayor confirmed that a workshop meeting will be undertaken and accept the extended participants as part of the CIA mechanism.

5.2 Water restrictors

Discussion took place around the water restrictors and tampering that has been undertaken by some.

Gina will follow up on whether enforcement action can be undertaken and what the consequences are. Will advise of outcome when known.

5.3 PC3 – Significant Natural Areas

Simon Thurston - *Recap of the Plan Change:*

- The plan change was initiated to give effect to Council's commitment to investigate additional significant natural areas (SNAs), which Council committed to when it issued its decisions on the District Plan in 2014.
- Purpose of identifying all the Significant Natural Areas is to give effect to Regional Policy Requirements and ultimately the Resource Management Act regarding the protection of significant habitat and/or areas of significant indigenous vegetation
- The plan change considers additional sites for SNAs and amendments to the boundaries of existing SNAs.
- There are a number of sites of significance for Ngāti Rangawewehi
- In Ngāti Rangiwewehi Rohe new or expanded sites being considered at Pipikarihi Road, Mervyn Street, Te Waerenga Road, Jackson Road, Anderson Road and Dudley Road and Hauraki Stream; as well as a large cluster of forest remnants in Kaharoa Area.
- The Rotorua Lakes Council has consulted with Māori land trusts and some have sought memorandum of understanding for protection as alternative to SNA

Update on Process and Status

- Hearing was held in February by independent commissioners
- Still waiting the commissioners' recommendations – expected any day

Next Steps:

- Decision will be notified and submitters have opportunity to appeal.
- Landowners will also be informed of decision
- We are aiming to bring the decision to Council by the end of July/August

5.4 PC10 – update

Aimee McGregor (RLC)

1. Stage 1 of the hearing (last year) found in favour of retaining the sector averages/grand-parenting approach to allocation but required that A) an allocation of Nitrogen be made for Settlement land and B) various other smaller matters be dealt with
2. With respect to B), through a process of formal mediation and ongoing communication and cooperation, these have all been dealt with and a Consent Order from the Court was received on 29 May which enacts these agreed changes.
3. With respect to part A) an allocation of N to Settlement land
 - a. Settlement land is held by CNI and Ngāti Rangiwewehi and jointly accounts for 10% of the rural land in the Rotorua groundwater catchment (PC10 area)
 - b. This matter is going to Environment Court on 7 September in Rotorua
 - c. We are aligned with BOPRC on the amount of N to be allocated – they are suggesting 8.2tN and the Natural capital Group (NCG) suggest at least 8tN
 - i. BOPRC approach was to apply similar analysis as was used to determine the amount for Te Tura Whenua Maori land in the original hearing
 - ii. NCG used a “credible futures” approach which basically added up a list of N requirements for investments and activities that CNI and Ngāti Rangiwewehi consider that they may make
 - d. Federated Farmers suggest 3.5tN (from reductions across all farmers of 0.69%) and that it should not be allowed to be leased or traded (even though it would be good for their farmers to have the option to lease)
 - i. They don’t think Settlement land will develop to the extent that requires 8tN or more.
 - ii. They are concerned that this will be taken to create a precedent for resource allocation to settlement land in the future outside of Rotorua
4. Other points to note:
 - a. The NCG team has changed slightly to learn from Stage 1

- RLC is still committed to support. Stage 2 remains important for RLC as:
 - Greater equity & greater economic development opportunity with flow on well-being impacts for CNI owners and Ngāti Rangiwewehi
 - Much of proposed development on Treaty land will connect to urban WWTP requiring a transfer of allocation.

Nikki Douglas - Discussions have been held with BOPRC, NR & CNI around nitrogen allocation to settlement land and what it might look like for NR and the collective.

A hearing to be held 11 August is about trying to secure that allocation of nitrogen to our lands. Our view is to use our cultural impact assessment from the 1st round of environmental court hearings as the lens through which we've identified as what our allocation should be. I would profess that this would be a higher test than anyone else has had to meet. Due to the approach we've taken.

Acknowledge the support from RLC & Gina for helping us pull this together and articulate the reframing of our CIA so we've been able to secure that nutrient allocation.

Once again would like to acknowledge the role Council has played in the leadership around PC10 in terms of understanding the challenges by Hapu, iwi and landowners around the inequity of the model that was initially presented. Greatly acknowledged.

Te Rangikaheke – thanked Aimee for the incredible summary because of the amount of time and resourcing into this piece of work over many years.

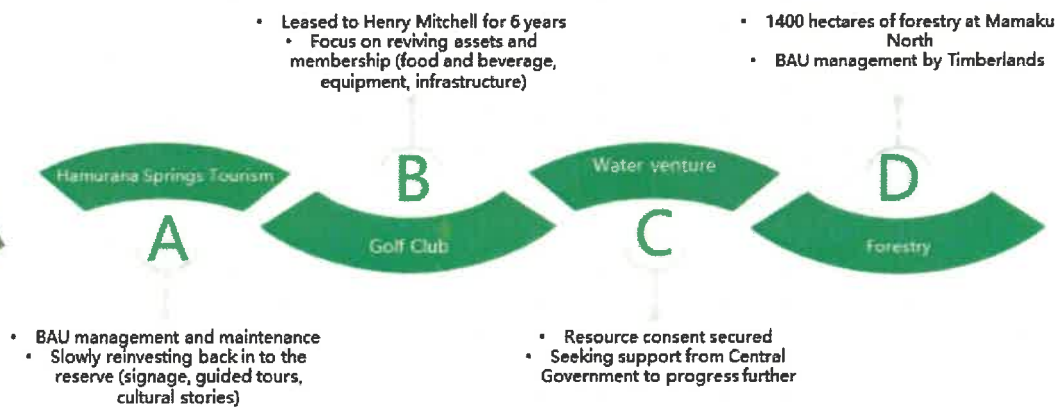

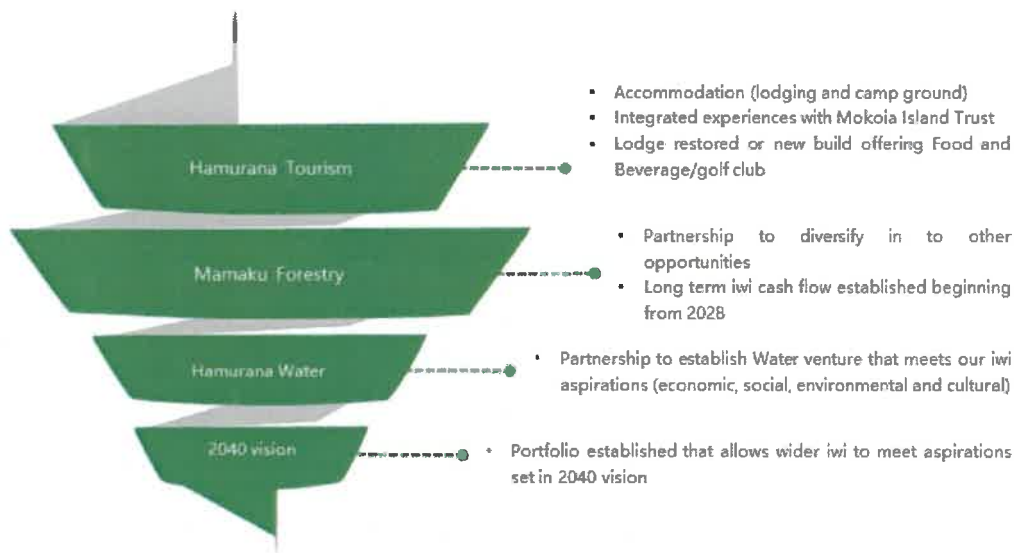

Purpose	To ensure that Ngāti Rangiwewehi are informed, involved and participating in projects and/or decisions that will or may affect resources within the Ngāti Rangiwewehi Tribal territory.
Principles of the Protocol	The parties acknowledge: • The autonomy of each other and their rights to develop, promote and action plans, policies goals and objectives that reflect the views of those that they represent. • The traditional, cultural, spiritual and historical relationships of Ngāti Rangiwewehi and their areas of interest. • Articles I, II, III of the Te Tiriti o Waitangi/Treaty of Waitangi and the principles of that Treaty. • That this protocol is a living document and will require review from time to time by mutual agreement. The parties accept that: • Effective, lasting and trusting relationships that contribute to each other's wellbeing take time to develop. • Successful relationships are achieved with meetings to discuss their areas of interest in a kanohi ki te kanohi on a regular basis. • Have an open door approach so issues that arise between the meetings can be quickly brought to the other parties attention. • Relationships that operate in good faith can resolve disagreements that will inevitably arise from time to time.

4. IWI PRESENTATIONS Strategy, Vision & Kaupapa

Ngāti Rangiwewehi members spoke to “Ngāti Rangiwewehi” Powerpoint presentation (Attachment 1)

4.1 Member update

Kerri Anne Hancock – Trustee (Rangiwewehi Charitable Trust)

Michael Hancock is the Director Chair of “Te Kaikaitahuna Management Company Ltd”

Patariki Clark - Implementation Ranger

Nicola (Nikki) Douglas, Vinnie Brown & Cr Maxwell trustees on PSGE Te Tahuhu o Tawakeheimoa Trust

4.2 Iwi Relationships (Slide 6)

As part of the Te Roopu Hauora o Te Arawa (Slide 6) it was noted that there were many families with no connectivity.

The Mayor suggested this task could be approached jointly

4.3 National Policy Statement for Fresh water management.

Further discussion took place regarding Regional Council.

Nikki Douglas commented on the National Policy Statement and suggested that at a Strategic Level a conversation be held between Ngāti Rangiwewehi and RLC, to look at how this can be taken to a Regional Policy conversation moving forward.

4.4 Implementation Ranger

Patariki Clark - Highlighted the uniqueness of his role with Ngāti Rangiwewehi.

Works specifically for Ngāti Rangiwewehi whereas his colleagues around the country work for iwi collectives.

Talked further around the RMP (Reserves Management Plan), CMP (Cultural Materials Plan) and Ngāti Rangiwewehi's Environmental Plan. (Slide 15)

- 5 reserves returned to Ngāti Rangiwewehi (Slide 16)

Doesn't capture all the reserves from Mokoia to Maketu that Ngāti Rangiwewehi have an interest in within DOC.

Significance is it includes Tawakeheimoa forest where there are major based employment opportunities.

Discussions currently underway on how Ngāti Rangiwewehi can leverage off this.

There are 1400 Hectares within Tawakeheimoa forest.

- Part of the treaty settlement - Ngāti Rangiwewehi is in collaboration with Tapuika building a nursery.
- Iwi need to be recognised as a partner not a stakeholder or a community group.
- Iwi sit alongside the department of conservation.

The Mayor asked Patariki if he had aspirations to share this more widely with Te Arawa and through the Lakes Trust.

Patariki replied that 3 years in this role is not enough time to achieve all aspirations.

Making connections to obtain a cohesive plan that embraces all of the iwi of Te Arawa would be a medium to long term plan.

The opportunity for collaboration and partnerships are important for Ngāti Rangiwewehi to progress to meet their vision and aspirations.

Primary focus right now is establishing Ngāti Rangiwewehi and the platform that they work from. This could become a model to work from with other iwi.

4.5 Hamuarana Springs – Te Arawa Wai Warriors

This is a programme engaging the youth and giving them an understanding and Kaitiakitanga about fresh water. If launched and successful, rangatahi will undertake a monitoring programme of a Koaro at Hamurana. There are other sites designated throughout the Te Arawa rohe that the Te Arawa Wai Warriors plan to monitor.

4.6 Iwi environmental management plan

Kerriann Hancock- Plan which was drafted in 2012 and updated in 2014. Currently looking at updating and future proofing it. (Slide 18)

How do we utilise the spatial plan to help us be proactive, and engage with the likes of Councils, planners etc. Ngāti Rangiwewehi's own spatial plan would be a key tool to improve engagement.

The Mayor and CE made comment to this proactive decision and confirmed that RLC assist where they can.

4.7 Housing Strategy

Gina Rangi- The Housing Strategy is out for consultation. Developed by a combination of Council and Te Arawa principally, but also input from Kainga ora and other essential government agencies. There is direction around housing for the west side and potential plans and we require the communities thoughts/suggestions. We have a hui a iwi consultation tentatively scheduled for the 28 of this month. Invitations will be sent once confirmed.

The housing strategy is not just about building housing, its about education ie: Where are schools going to be, transport, infrastructure, water supply and papakainga.

Invitations to Hui a Iwi Consultation to be sent to Te Rangikaheke once date is confirmed.

The Mayor asked that an agreement to assist Ngāti Rangiwewehi with Spatial plan be noted.

4.8 Te Maru o Kaituna Representatives

Kerriann Hancock and Vinnie Brown are the Ngāti Rangiwewehi representatives. Acknowledged Ben for securing the Co-Governance arrangement. Action plan was developed last year. There is potential for Ngāti Rangiwewehi to lead some work around, our connection, cultural materials use, recreating our journey/connection back to the coast. Looking at making application for funding and would appreciate the active support of Council on any application we make and identify how we might work together delivering our joint aspirations around the Kaituna.

4.9 Hamurana Water Supply

Te Rangikaheke - A request to re-invigorate our desire for the return of the land from DOC and also the implementation of Kaitiaki flows over Hamurana as part of that.

Infrastructure to consider how RLC can provide for Kaitiaki flows at Hamurana

Apologies RMP(Reserve Management Plan) not available to table today.

5. RLC Projects update**5.1 Joint resource consent; Storm water consent; Hamurana springs water supply resource consent**

Greg Manzano (RLC infrastructure planning manager) spoke to powerpoint presentation (Attachment 2).

Reviewed the Journey RLC & Ngāti Rangiwewehi have had to date and covered the points highlighted in presentation.

Te Rangikaheke advised that a proposal will be put forward inviting Kerriann Hancock & Nicola Douglas to join the consenting team. Key reason is part of the succession planning.

Gregg advised that due to time frame this would have to be done asap.

Confirmation of meeting required asap so a timeline can be established.

Mayor confirmed that a workshop meeting will be undertaken and accept the extended participants as part of the CIA mechanism.

5.2 Water restrictors

Discussion took place around the water restrictors and tampering that has been undertaken by some.

Gina will follow up on whether enforcement action can be undertaken and what the consequences are. Will advise of outcome when known.

5.3 PC3 – Significant Natural Areas

Simon Thurston - *Recap of the Plan Change:*

- The plan change was initiated to give effect to Council's commitment to investigate additional significant natural areas (SNAs), which Council committed to when it issued its decisions on the District Plan in 2014.
- Purpose of identifying all the Significant Natural Areas is to give effect to Regional Policy Requirements and ultimately the Resource Management Act regarding the protection of significant habitat and/or areas of significant indigenous vegetation
- The plan change considers additional sites for SNAs and amendments to the boundaries of existing SNAs.
- There are a number of sites of significance for Ngāti Rangawewehi
- In Ngāti Rangiwewehi Rohe new or expanded sites being considered at Pipikarihi Road, Mervyn Street, Te Waerenga Road, Jackson Road, Anderson Road and Dudley Road and Hauraki Stream; as well as a large cluster of forest remnants in Kaharoa Area.
- The Rotorua Lakes Council has consulted with Māori land trusts and some have sought memorandum of understanding for protection as alternative to SNA

Update on Process and Status

- Hearing was held in February by independent commissioners
- Still waiting the commissioners' recommendations – expected any day

Next Steps:

- Decision will be notified and submitters have opportunity to appeal.
- Landowners will also be informed of decision
- We are aiming to bring the decision to Council by the end of July/August

5.4 PC10 – update

Aimee McGregor (RLC)

1. Stage 1 of the hearing (last year) found in favour of retaining the sector averages/grand-parenting approach to allocation but required that A) an allocation of Nitrogen be made for Settlement land and B) various other smaller matters be dealt with
 2. With respect to B), through a process of formal mediation and ongoing communication and cooperation, these have all been dealt with and a Consent Order from the Court was received on 29 May which enacts these agreed changes.
 3. With respect to part A) an allocation of N to Settlement land
 - a. Settlement land is held by CNI and Ngāti Rangiwewehi and jointly accounts for 10% of the rural land in the Rotorua groundwater catchment (PC10 area)
 - b. This matter is going to Environment Court on 7 September in Rotorua
 - c. We are aligned with BOPRC on the amount of N to be allocated – they are suggesting 8.2tN and the Natural capital Group (NCG) suggest at least 8tN
 - i. BOPRC approach was to apply similar analysis as was used to determine the amount for Te Tura Whenua Maori land in the original hearing
 - ii. NCG used a “credible futures” approach which basically added up a list of N requirements for investments and activities that CNI and Ngāti Rangiwewehi consider that they may make
 - d. Federated Farmers suggest 3.5tN (from reductions across all farmers of 0.69%) and that it should not be allowed to be leased or traded (even though it would be good for their farmers to have the option to lease)
 - i. They don’t think Settlement land will develop to the extent that requires 8tN or more.
 - ii. They are concerned that this will be taken to create a precedent for resource allocation to settlement land in the future outside of Rotorua
 4. Other points to note:
 - a. The NCG team has changed slightly to learn from Stage 1
 - i. QC Paul Radich has been engaged by CNI – this is a significant boost to the legal team
 - b. NCG stage 2 evidence
 - i. Economic impact – Dr Richard Meade (**NEW** has worked for CNI before)
 - ii. N requirements for land uses connected to WWTP - Alison Lowe from RLC
 - iii. N requirements for horticultural- Stephen Trolove (NZ Institute for Plant and Food Research)
 - iv. Planning – Bridget Robson
 - v. Cultural Stage 2 CAI – Nicki Douglas (TALT), Lani Kereopa (Ngāti Whakaue), Rangitihi Pene (Tuhourangi and Te Pumautanga) and Te Rangikaheke Yvonne Moana Bidios (Ngāti Rangiwewehi)
 - vi. CNI – Alamoti Te Pou
 - c. The outcome of this Stage 2 hearing in being watched in Waikato for PC1 and also Auckland for the Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act and dealing with the state that the Firth of Thames is in
- RLC is still committed to support. Stage 2 remains important for RLC as:
- Greater equity & greater economic development opportunity with flow on well-being impacts for CNI owners and Ngāti Rangiwewehi
 - Much of proposed development on Treaty land will connect to urban WWTP requiring a transfer of allocation.

Nikki Douglas - Discussions have been held with BOPRC, NR & CNI around nitrogen allocation to settlement land and what it might look like for NR and the collective.

A hearing to be held 11 August is about trying to secure that allocation of nitrogen to our lands. Our view is to use our cultural impact assessment from the 1st round of environmental court hearings as the lens through which we've identified as what our allocation should be. I would profess that this would be a higher test than anyone else has had to meet. Due to the approach we've taken.

Acknowledge the support from RLC & Gina for helping us pull this together and articulate the reframing of our CIA so we've been able to secure that nutrient allocation.

Once again would like to acknowledge the role Council has played in the leadership around PC10 in terms of understanding the challenges by Hapu, iwi and landowners around the inequity of the model that was initially presented. Greatly acknowledged.

Te Rangikaheke – thanked Aimee for the incredible summary because of the amount of time and resourcing into this piece of work over many years.

5.1 Progress Report on the Te Waro Uri (Taniwha Springs) Water Take for the Ngongotaha Municipal Water Supply

Report prepared by: Greg Manzano, Manager, Infrastructure Planning

1. TE PŪTAKE

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to update the Committee on the progress of work in achieving the shared outcomes articulated in the Co-management Agreement between Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council. The shared outcomes include the Te Waro Uri water take renewal application, the removal of the pumps from Te Waro Uri and restoration of the spring and surrounding areas.

2. HE TŪTOHUNGA

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the report, Progress Report on Te Waro Uri (Taniwha Springs) Water Take for the Ngongotahā Municipal Water Supply be received.

3. TE TĀHUHU

BACKGROUND

3.1 DEED RELATING TO TANIWHA SPRINGS/PEKEHAUA PUNA RESERVE

The Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council signed the Deed relating to Taniwha Springs/Pekehaua Puna Reserve in October 2016.

The overall objective of the Deed and the corresponding Co-management Agreement is to formalise the partnership of the two parties to work together towards the achievement of shared outcomes which includes:

- A strong, lasting and meaningful partnership between the Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council.
- A joint resource consent that enables the ongoing water take in a way that respects the cultural, environmental and economic aspirations of the Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust.

- Restoration of the Pekehaua Puna and Taniwha Springs area.
- Restoration and enhancement of the health of the Awahou Stream.
- An agreed easement allowing for Rotorua Lakes Council access to the Taniwha Springs site.

3.2 PROGRESS ON THE ACHIEVEMENT OF THE STATED SHARED OUTCOME

3.2.1 A strong and lasting meaningful partnership between the Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council.

A Working Group was formed with representatives from Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council staff to work jointly on:

- The water take renewal application
- Development, evaluation and agreement on options for the removal and re-siting of the existing pump within the spring
- Development of restoration options for the spring

The completion of the above was a result of genuine cooperation and respect from both parties.

3.2.2 A joint resource consent application for the renewal of the Te Waro Uri water take

The water take resource consent renewal application to Bay of Plenty Regional Council was submitted jointly by the Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust and the Rotorua Lakes Council six months before the 25 August 2018 expiry of the existing resource consent. Both parties were involved in the development and review of the resource consent application including reviewing and agreeing the proposal conditions of the new resource consent.

In this application, the Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust introduced the kaitiaki flow limits as a measure of cultural sustainability of the water take. This concept was articulated in the Cultural Impact Assessment prepared by Te Maru o Ngāti Rangiwewehi to support the resource consent application. The Bay of Plenty Regional Council has completed processing the application and are now undertaking a review of the final draft of the proposed resource consent conditions. It is expected that an approved resource consent will be issued in May/June 2021.

3.2.3 Restoration of the Pekehaua Puna and Taniwha Springs area

The first step towards the restoration of the Pekehaua Puna is the removal of the pumps within the springs and relocating them to a location agreed by the Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council.

The Working Group (Trust and Rotorua Lakes Council) developed and evaluated several options for the relocation of the pumps that are currently within the spring. An agreed option has been arrived at which has been the basis of a resource consent application that will authorise the construction of the new pumping system that will take water from the spring and supply it to the Ngongotahā water supply area.

The resource consent application is currently being processed by the Bay of Plenty Regional Council.

It is expected that an approved resource consent will be issued in May/June 2021, at the same time as the water take consent.

After the approval of the construction resource consent, the following is a programme of activities to enable the removal and relocation of the pumps within the spring:

Activities	Indicative Milestone Dates
Detailed engineering design of new pumping system completed	September 2021
Tender and contract award for the construction of new pumping system	October/November 2021
Construction of new pumping system start	December 2021 ¹

- 1 The intention is to do all the bulk earthworks and significant civil works during the summer of 2021/2022.

The removal of the pumps within the spring and the interconnection of the new pumping system is planned for the 2022 winter. This ensures that the work has minimal impact on the operation of the water supply system.

3.2.4 An agreed easement allowing for Rotorua Lakes Council access to Taniwha springs

This was achieved with the return of the Taniwha Spring site to the Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust. The Pekehaua Puna Reserve Trust then provided an easement to the Rotorua Lakes Council for access to the Taniwha Springs site.

Greg Manzano spoke to his report and gave the following update:

Water take resource consent:

A final meeting held for BOPRC Monday 24th May where the final draft resource consent with conditions will be presented to the working group.

When agreements to conditions from working party have been finalised consent will be returned to BOPRC for approval.

Construction consent:

Currently in process, expect final draft of the consent conditions in 2 weeks time.

A consultant has been commissioned to proceed with a detailed design. Aiming for completion and report by end of September.

Waiting on approval of consents is the hold up at the moment.

Gina Rangi: - First time in NZ a Council has had a joint consent with Mana whenua.

Normally Mana whenua views are taken into account, and ultimately Council hold the consent and makes the key decisions. Under this process its; jointly held with the Puna trustees.

It is a significant step for Council and mana whenua because it involves power-sharing.

Stavros Michael: - Reiterated the unique approach taken ie: the joint consent, the joint co-governance, the joint operations management plan for this facility. A significant amount of work has been undertaken between our team of technical advisors and Ngāti Rangiwewehi senior representatives.

The outcome is a joint consensus on managing and protecting the puna and impact on the Awahou, how the puna should look, best options to preserve its mauri, its presentation, future provisions etc.

A mutually pleasing result from all perspectives achieving, good technical outcomes, regulatory outcomes and also inter-relationships outcomes which are significant, and will lead us into the upcoming 3 waters challenge.

The Mayor requested that this incredible story of our journey be noted.

Further discussion took place around the table acknowledging the following:

- The work led by the Trust and RLC working group
- Congratulating those who paved the way for this working relationship including those no longer with us.
- That this hasn't been a smooth journey to reach this equal partnership.
- Ngāti Rangiwewehi never gave up, and here we are 25 years later
- Within this partnership it's not about looking after our commodity, it's about looking after our taonga, "ko te wairua ki te tangata".

Waiata "Huia" from Ngāti Rangiwewehi followed the korero from Anaru.

ATTENDANCE: Gina Mohi joined the Hui at 10.38am.

The Mayor directed that the item from Stavros Michael on "The 3 Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water & Storm Water)" be the next item on the Agenda.

5.2 The 3 Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water & Storm Water)"

Stavros Michael spoke to PowerPoint titled "Three Waters Reform Proposed" – **(Attachment 1)**

The key question is which parties will be affected by this reform. Careful attention is required on how these reforms are proposed and impact on mana whenua and Rotorua.

Mr Williams note the following points noted:

- Rotorua falls in a region including Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Taranaki and central North Island.
- We're small when you look at the scale of the region
- How responsive will that entity be to the things that are important to us?
- Approx. 30 to 40% of councils across the country are currently not willing to be part of this.
- A big concern is the pace of change.
- Council need to make a critical decision later this year on whether to support the reform
- Don't believe Council can make that decision alone – needs to be shared with Mana whenua affected by the reforms.
- It's not just community, council decision is pivotal to Te Arawa
- In my view discussions are required between government, Te Arawa, Ngāti Rangiwewehi and Council, around how important local control and decision making is to us.

Mr Williams made the following statement:

Today's protocol meeting is a good first opportunity to table this. It's an opportunity for Council and Mana whenua to consider setting up a Co-governance forum to make this very important decision.

This is a legacy decision, which will affect future generations. The impact of the decision means we need to make the decision in a different way.

Further discussion on the 3 waters reform continued with the following points noted.

- Local decision making is paramount.
- The Crown are not currently engaging adequately with iwi on this kaupapa, despite many requests and attempts.
- It's a consultation approach, rather than a partnership approach.
- If this continues to progress ahead of the rights and interests conversation then there is significant litigation risk.
- Being part of the wider solution is really important for both RLC and mana Whenua.
- If there's going to be a true partnership it needs to be represented on both sides of the table.
- This discussion requires prioritising. Also do we invite the Crown to have a conversation with us directly as a community, (Ngāti Rangiwewehi and council) on this kaupapa.

5.3 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU)

The Chair commented on the value of discussions at our MOU but there's not enough urgency at this forum.

It was noted that at a previous meeting an agenda item to review the MOU was raised. Ngāti Rangiwewehi are ready to move to the next level.

Action: The Mayor asked for the MOU to be reviewed.

Gina Mohi - provided feedback from a recent meeting held at the Holiday Inn, regarding this reform.

- We were informed assets will stay in Councils hand, but management was moving over.
- These assets "going to someone else to manage" are our intergenerational investments.
- Who is "Te Taumata Arowai" accountable too?
- There will be iwi around the motu, who will just go No. Others will say we want to say no, but if we have to agree, then here's the mitigation.

Further discussion took place around tomorrow's meeting regarding Māori wards, Te Tiriti and the concerns regarding the reform process.

5.4 Housing – Emergency update

Rosemary Viskovic - spoke to powerpoint titled "He Papakāinga, He Hāpori Taurikura"
(Attachment 2)

Powerpoint highlighted the following

- Strategy Development timeline
- Vision
- Work Streams (Reminder: its not a Council strategy, there are many players who are part of this.)
- Emergency Housing Taskforce

The Chair added the following comments

- We've got the attention of government to address safe, suitable emergency housing for families and children.
- It's a first to have a task force set up in a Council building, and to be working alongside iwi to find a way forward.
- But we're not there yet.

Further discussion took place around Papakāinga and its challenges:

The following noted

- Structure planning – Who from Kāinga Ora should come talk to iwi?
- There's a need to avoid adhoc planning on Māori land
- Infrastructure – The process for whānau to build on whenua is arduous

Request to Council

There's a need for navigation in this area.

6. **NGĀTI RANGIWEWEHI PROJECTS UPDATES**

Tirohanga Whānui – Te Rangikāheke Bidois gave an overview **(Attachment 3)**

- Intergenerational succession is extremely important
- Statistics (Taunga)
- There are 2 Rangiwewehi marae

Challenge for Ngāti Rangiwewehi at the moment is the revitalisation of the trust structure. Stavros Michael advised that when Ngāti Rangiwewehi, the trusts are ready RLC are here to help.

Background	On 22 September 2010 at Mataikotare Marae a protocol was signed between Council and Ngāti Rangiwewehi. The protocol was originally developed, in part, as a result of negotiations between the Crown and Ngāti Rangiwewehi to reach agreement on the settlement of historic claims.
Purpose	To ensure that Ngāti Rangiwewehi are informed, involved and participating in projects and/or decisions that will or may affect resources within the Ngāti Rangiwewehi Tribal territory.
Principles of the Protocol	The parties acknowledge: • The autonomy of each other and their rights to develop, promote and action plans, policies goals and objectives that reflect the views of those that they represent. • The traditional, cultural, spiritual and historical relationships of Ngāti Rangiwewehi and their areas of interest. • Articles I, II, III of the Te Tiriti o Waitangi/Treaty of Waitangi and the principles of that Treaty. • That this protocol is a living document and will require review from time to time by mutual agreement. The parties accept that: • Effective, lasting and trusting relationships that contribute to each other's wellbeing take time to develop. • Successful relationships are achieved with meetings to discuss their areas of interest in a kanohi ki te kanohi on a regular basis. • Have an open door approach so issues that arise between the meetings can be quickly brought to the other parties attention. • Relationships that operate in good faith can resolve disagreements that will inevitably arise from time to time.

5. SHARED PROJECTS UPDATES

5.1 Progress Report on the Te Waro Uri (Taniwha Springs) water take for the Ngongotaha Municipal water supply.

Resolved

That the report “Progress Report on the Te Waro Uri(Taniwha Springs) Water take for the Ngongotaha Municipal Water Supply” be received

Greg Manzano spoke to his report and gave the following update:

Water take resource consent:

A final meeting held for BOPRC Monday 24th May where the final draft resource consent with conditions will be presented to the working group.

When agreements to conditions from working party have been finalised consent will be returned to BOPRC for approval.

Construction consent:

Currently in process, expect final draft of the consent conditions in 2 weeks time.

A consultant has been commissioned to proceed with a detailed design. Aiming for completion and report by end of September.

Waiting on approval of consents is the hold up at the moment.

Gina Rangi: - First time in NZ a Council has had a joint consent with Mana whenua.

Normally Mana whenua views are taken into account, and ultimately Council hold the consent and makes the key decisions. Under this process it's jointly held with the Puna trustees.

It is a significant step for Council and mana whenua because it involves power-sharing.

Stavros Michael: - Reiterated the unique approach taken ie: the joint consent, the joint co-governance, the joint operations management plan for this facility. A significant amount of work has been undertaken between our team of technical advisors and Ngāti Rangiwewehi senior representatives.

The outcome is a joint consensus on managing and protecting the puna and impact on the Awahou, how the puna should look, best options to preserve its mauri, its presentation, future provisions etc.

A mutually pleasing result from all perspectives achieving, good technical outcomes, regulatory outcomes and also inter-relationships outcomes which are significant, and will lead us into the upcoming 3 waters challenge.

The Mayor requested that this incredible story of our journey be noted.

Further discussion took place around the table acknowledging the following:

- The work led by the Trust and RLC working group
- Congratulating those who paved the way for this working relationship including those no longer with us.
- That this hasn't been a smooth journey to reach this equal partnership.
- Ngāti Rangiwewehi never gave up, and here we are 25 years later
- Within this partnership it's not about looking after our commodity, it's about looking after our taonga, "ko te wairua ki te tangata".

Waiata "Huia" from Ngāti Rangiwewehi followed the korero from Anaru.

ATTENDANCE: Gina Mohi joined the Hui at 10.38am.

The Mayor directed that the item from Stavros Michael on "The 3 Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water & Storm Water)" be the next item on the Agenda.

5.2 The 3 Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water & Storm Water)"

Stavros Michael spoke to PowerPoint titled "Three Waters Reform Proposed" – (**Attachment 1**)

The key question is which parties will be affected by this reform. Careful attention is required on how these reforms are proposed and impact on mana whenua and Rotorua.

The following points from Mr Williams were noted:

- Rotorua falls in a region including Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Taranaki and central North Island.
- We're small when you look at the scale of the region
- How responsive will that entity be to the things that are important to us?
- Approximately 30 to 40% of councils across the country are currently not willing to be part of this.
- A big concern is the pace of change.
- Council need to make a critical decision later this year on whether to support the reform
- Don't believe Council can make that decision alone – needs to be shared with Mana whenua affected by the reforms.
- It's not just community, council decision is pivotal to Te Arawa
- In my view discussions are required between government, Te Arawa, Ngāti Rangiwewehi and Council, around how important local control and decision making is to us.

Mr Williams made the following statement:

Today's protocol meeting is a good first opportunity to table this. It's an opportunity for Council and Mana whenua to consider setting up a Co-governance forum to make this very important decision.

This is a legacy decision, which will affect future generations. The impact of the decision means we need to make the decision in a different way.

Further discussion on the 3 waters reform continued with the following points noted.

- Local decision making is paramount.
- The Crown are not currently engaging adequately with iwi on this kaupapa, despite many requests and attempts.
- It's a consultation approach, rather than a partnership approach.
- If this continues to progress ahead of the rights and interests conversation then there is significant litigation risk.
- Being part of the wider solution is really important for both RLC and mana Whenua.
- If there's going to be a true partnership it needs to be represented on both sides of the table.
- This discussion requires prioritising. Also do we invite the Crown to have a conversation with us directly as a community, (Ngāti Rangiwewehi and council) on this kaupapa.

5.3 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU)

The Chair commented on the value of discussions at our MOU but there's not enough urgency at this forum.

It was noted that at a previous meeting an agenda item to review the MOU was raised. Ngāti Rangiwewehi are ready to move to the next level.

Action: The Mayor asked for the MOU to be reviewed.

Gina Mohi - provided feedback from a recent meeting held at the Holiday Inn, regarding this reform.

- We were informed assets will stay in Councils hand, but management was moving over.
- These assets "going to someone else to manage" are our intergenerational investments.
- Who is "Te Taumata Arowai" accountable too?
- There will be iwi around the motu, who will just go No. Others will say we want to say no, but if we have to agree, then here's the mitigation.

Further discussion took place around tomorrow's meeting regarding Māori wards, Te Tiriti and the concerns regarding the reform process.

5.4 Housing – Emergency update

Rosemary Viskovic - spoke to powerpoint titled “He Papakāinga, He Hāpori Taurikura”
(Attachment 2)

Powerpoint highlighted the following

- Strategy Development timeline
- Vision
- Work Streams (Reminder: its not a Council strategy, there are many players who are part of this.)
- Emergency Housing Taskforce

The Chair added the following comments

- We’ve got the attention of government to address safe, suitable emergency housing for families and children.
- It’s a first to have a task force set up in a Council building, and to be working alongside iwi to find a way forward.
- But we’re not there yet.

Further discussion took place around Papakāinga and its challenges:

The following noted

- Structure planning – Who from Kāinga Ora should come talk to iwi?
- There’s a need to avoid adhoc planning on Māori land
- Infrastructure – The process for whānau to build on whenua is arduous

Request to Council

There’s a need for navigation in this area.

6. **NGĀTI RANGIWEWEHI PROJECTS UPDATES**

Tirohanga Whānui – Te Rangikāheke Bidois gave an overview **(Attachment 3)**

- Intergenerational succession is extremely important
- Statistics (Taunga)

Te Tāhūhū o Tawakeheimoa Trust – update

Ngāti Rangiwewehi have been in discussions with DOC basically asking them to honour their statutory commitments.

Discussion took place around requirements to assist with Papakāinga.

Ngāti Rangiwewehi noted desire to build papakāinga. They acknowledged that good planning is a must, a navigator would be helpful.

Someone to lead the process, and work with our land trusts to facilitate the planning and the construction.

Challenge for Ngāti Rangiwewehi at the moment is the revitalisation of the trust structure. Stavros Michael advised that when Ngāti Rangiwewehi, the trusts are ready RLC are here to help.

7. General Business

Traffic safety is becoming an issue at the Marae entrance roadway and a suggestion was to place judder bars at either end of the road.

Grateful to have Playground moved to a safer place which RLC were part of.

Action - The Chair suggested holding discussion with Stavros Michael.

Gina Rangi gave a verbal report noting that there is a housing shortage and we expect more housing development across the city, including Ngongotahā. Council has applied for Crown funding to support good infrastructure to support that growth.

Discussion took place around the impact of housing growth on water take and the importance of these discussions. Engagement processes are necessary particularly for the application of the resource consents.

5. SHARED PROJECT UPDATES

5.1 3 WATERS UPDATE:

Stavros Michael provided an overview:

- Rotorua Lakes Council (RLC) shares many of the Government's concerns and diagnosis of the problems with Three Waters management nationally.
- The key concern in the reforms is the opportunities for local communities to have a meaningful input in strategic decision making. Locally, the current system has allowed for example, RLC working with Ngāti Rangiwewehi to return of the puna to the hapū and the joint resource consent application.
- RLC wants to ensure that the trust built with our local communities will not be compromised through a distant organisation such as those proposed and that legal commitments made to mana whenua will be adhered to.

Nicki Douglas gave an update regarding their meeting with Minister Mahuta:

- Ngāti Rangiwewehi clarified that considering their current position on water and joint position in management, they anticipate to be involved the decision making process around the 3 waters.
- Discussions yet to be held around how this will be done in conjunction with Council.

6. NGĀTI RANGIWEWEHI PROJECT UPDATES

6.1 LEVEL 2 COVID UPDATES (TARIMANO MARAE OPERATIONS AND THE HAMURANA SPRINGS RECREATION RESERVE)

- Only one Tangihanga held to date.
- Some families chose to hold Tangihanga at home or White Haven Funeral Home.
- Marae trust formalised Level 2 operations.
- High number of vaccinations have been undertaken.

Noting the discussion regarding Tangihanga, the Mayor said there is a natural burial proposal which is gaining momentum, and recommended this item be included for discussion on a future agenda.

6.2 IWI AUTHORITY (TE PUREI, TE MANA O TE WAI CASE STUDY, PLAN CHANGE 9)

Te Purei

Joe Tuhakaraina gave an update around the challenges of maintaining Hamurana Park due to lack of staff and tourists. Motorhomes are a focus at present. Hamurana Golf course is contracted out and is doing well.

Te Mana o te Wai case study

Nicki Douglas gave an update:

- The purpose of this project was about identifying and understanding how hapū and iwi could be directly involved in implementing the National Policy Statement on Freshwater Management. Ngāti Rangiwewehi is involved in the case study.
- Katerina Pihera- Ridge and Kerri Anne Hancock produced a report documenting the history of Pekehaua and Awahou; joint consent; 3 Waters; Te Mana o te Wai and the relationship between that concept and policy.
- Provides two frameworks to support decision making and the way Ngāti Rangiwewehi engage in natural resource management.
- This will become a core document.

Ms Douglas suggested inviting Ms Pihera- Ridge and Ms Hancock to a future meeting to speak to this report.

Plan Change 9

Te Rangikaheke Bidois advised Plan Change 9 to be heard at the High Court on 29 November. Ngāti Rangiwewehi joined with two other iwi, including Ngāti Makino, in opposition. A barrister who has offered his assistance without charge.

6.3 Te Tāhūhū o Tawakeheimoa Trust/Kaitahuna Management Co (Hamurana Municipal Water Supply renewal)

Te Rangikaheke Bidois advised consideration to be given to this land being returned from the Department of Conservation and Ngāti Rangiwewehi would look to pursuing this with Rotorua Lakes Council.

6.4 Pekehaia Puna Reserve Trust and RLC (Engagement of Ngāti Rangiwewehi Tari Taiao Unit)

Mr Michael gave a verbal report:

- A condition of the joint resource consents is the development of cultural monitoring, management and restoration plans.
- These reports address the challenge of normalising and operationalising cultural values.
- RLC sees cultural inputs into the construction and upgrade at the puna need to be given the same consideration as technical engineering and economic factors.
- Trust and confidence need to be maintained between the parties.

Purpose	To ensure that Ngāti Rangiwewehi are informed, involved and participating in projects and/or decisions that will or may affect resources within the Ngāti Rangiwewehi Tribal territory.
Principles of the Protocol	The parties acknowledge: • The autonomy of each other and their rights to develop, promote and action plans, policies goals and objectives that reflect the views of those that they represent. • The traditional, cultural, spiritual and historical relationships of Ngāti Rangiwewehi and their areas of interest. • Articles I, II, III of the Te Tiriti o Waitangi/Treaty of Waitangi and the principles of that Treaty. • That this protocol is a living document and will require review from time to time by mutual agreement. The parties accept that: • Effective, lasting and trusting relationships that contribute to each other's wellbeing take time to develop. • Successful relationships are achieved with meetings to discuss their areas of interest in a kanohi ki te kanohi on a regular basis. • Have an open door approach so issues that arise between the meetings can be quickly brought to the other parties attention. • Relationships that operate in good faith can resolve disagreements that will inevitably arise from time to time.
