## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report presents the results of the 2008 Rotorua District Perceptions of Safety Survey undertaken within the Rotorua District of New Zealand. A total of 403 local residents were surveyed via telephone to establish:

- perceptions of general safety in the Central Business District (CBD);
- perceptions of general safety in the local neighbourhood and the home during the day-time and night-time;
- perceptions of vehicle safety when parked unattended both in the CBD and around the district;
- actual incidents of crime and the frequency of alcohol consumption by offenders; and
- residents' awareness of initiatives currently in place to reduce crime.

The key findings are summarised in this section and detailed in the report that follows.

### Key Findings

#### Safety in the CBD

- More than four-fifths (82.4%) of respondents visited the CBD on a daily or weekly basis (20.6% and 61.8% respectively), compared with 79.2% in 2007, 75.2% in 2006 and 73.9% in 2005.
- During the day-time, 91.9% of respondents felt 'very safe' or 'safe' in the CBD (compared with 90.7% in 2007, 81.2% in 2006 and 86.7% in 2005), while 2.7% of respondents felt 'unsafe' or 'very unsafe' (compared with 3.4% in 2007, 2.7% in 2006 and 5.4% in 2005).

Factors making respondents feel safe in the CBD during the day-time included presence of other people, presence of police, light and security cameras.

Reasons for feeling unsafe in the CBD during the day-time included the presence of undesirables and groups of young people, the bad reputation of the specific area and the distance from the town centre.

During the day-time, the respondents who indicated they felt unsafe, felt this way at:

- City Focus/Post Office and Kuirau Park (two respondents each)
- Rotorua Central Mall and shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets (one respondent each).

- At night-time, respondents who felt 'very safe' or 'safe' in the CBD dropped to 27.3% (compared with 28.6% in 2007, 23.5% in 2006 and 26.8% in 2005), while 25.6% of respondents felt 'unsafe' or 'very unsafe' (compared with 23.4% in 2007, 17.6% in 2006 and 21.5% in 2005).

Factors making respondents feel safe in the CBD during the night-time included presence of other people, light, the presence of police and security cameras.

Reasons for feeling unsafe in the CBD during the night-time included groups of young people, poor lighting, undesirables, the reputation of the area, proximity to bars/clubs and negative personal experience.

During the night-time, the respondents who indicated they felt unsafe, felt this way at:


- City Focus/Post Office and the shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets (17 respondents each)
- The Street (15 respondents)
- Lake Front (14 respondents).

## Vehicle Safety


- Respondents were asked if they worry about their vehicle being broken into or stolen when parked in Rotorua's CBD, at any time during the day or night.
- During the day-time, 16.6% 'always worry' or 'usually worry' (compared with 15.8% in 2007, 20.6% in 2006 and 20.5% in 2005), while 24.6% 'sometimes worry' and 53.1% 'never worry'. A further 5.7% of respondents did not park in the CBD during the day-time.
- During the night-time, 31.3% 'always worry' or 'usually worry' (compared with 25.9% in 2007, 27.3% in 2006 and 27.8% in 2005), while 22.8% 'sometimes worry' and 14.6% 'never worry'. Nearly one-third of respondents (30.5%) did not park in the CBD during the night-time.
- More than one-half of respondents (57.8%) felt there are unsafe places to park their vehicle within the CBD (a decrease of 5.9% since 2007). Of those, the most common mentions included:
  - Kurau Park (69 respondents)
  - Lake Front (68 respondents)
  - Government Gardens (48 respondents)
  - Polynesian Spa (44 respondents)
  - Rotorua Central Mall (35 respondents)
  - Shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets (31 respondents)
  - 'Other' places mentioned by 87 respondents included supermarket car parks, areas near to the hospitals, side streets, the area around the movie theatre and Spotlight, the area near the car parking building, around the Convention Centre, streets close to the Lake Front (ie, Pukaki, Whakaue and Rangiuру), Amohia Street and Hinemaru Street.
- Reasons for vehicle concern included isolated locations, poor street lighting, the high number of break-ins and vehicle theft, frequently targeted locations, personal experience with vehicle crime and the presence of 'undesirables'.
- Three-fifths (61.5%) of respondents felt there are unsafe places to park a vehicle in other areas around Rotorua, compared to 67.1% in 2007 and 54.3% in 2006. Of those, the most common mentions included:
  - The Redwood Forest car park (66 respondents)
  - Blue/Green Lake (58 respondents)
  - Okere Falls (54 respondents)
  - Kerosene Creek (37 respondents).

## Safety in the Local Neighbourhood and Home


- During the day-time, 89.8% of respondents felt 'very safe' or 'safe' in their local neighbourhood compared to 91.2% in 2007, 83.5% in 2006 and 84.5% in 2005.




- At night-time 73.2% of respondents felt 'very safe' or 'safe' in their local neighbourhood, compared to 76.9% in 2007, 65.6% in 2006 and 72.6% in 2005.



- During the day-time, 93.8% of respondents felt either 'very safe' or 'safe' in their home compared to 92.7% in 2007, 93.9% in 2006 and 90.5% in 2005.



- At night-time 85.1% of respondents felt 'very safe' or 'safe' in their home, compared to 84.9% in 2007, 87.5% in 2006 and 82.6% in 2005.



## Safety in Rotorua


- When asked if they felt that Rotorua is generally a safe place to live, a total of 24.6% of respondents stated 'definitely', followed by 'mostly' (58.3%), 'not really' (13.9%) and 'definitely not' (2.5%).
- Those respondents who stated Rotorua is 'not really'/'definitely not' a safe place to live (16.4%) gave reasons including high crime rate (65.2% of those respondents who stated that Rotorua is 'not really'/definitely not' a safe place to live), not safe in some areas/undesirables (28.8%) and problems with young people (24.2%). 'Other' reasons specified included drugs, gangs, unemployment, media profile of crime, less police, tourist related crime and personal experience with crime.
- When asked about trusting other people, 46.9% of respondents stated that they 'can trust people', an increase on previous years' results. A similar number (43.9%) stated that you 'can't be too careful when dealing with people' (a decrease from the 2007 results of 46.0%). A further 7.4% could not make a distinction in their trust of other people (ie, 50/50).

## Personal Experience with Crime during Last 12 Months (ie, March 2007 - March 2008)


- A total of 16.6% of respondents identified that they or someone in their household had had items stolen from their vehicle over the past 12 months (compared with 12.9% in 2007 and 15.2% in 2006), while 7.9% of respondents identified that they, or someone in their household, had had their vehicle, bike or motorcycle stolen (compared with 7.6% in 2007 and 9.1% in 2006).
- The number of respondents who have experienced someone gaining entry into their home or garage without permission in the past 12 months continued on a small but steady increase to reach 13.2% in 2008, up from 12.5% in 2007 and 11.8% in 2006.
- Four respondents (1.0%) had been victim to theft (or attempted theft) of items they were carrying, continuing the trend of small but steady decreases since 2005.
- Around one-quarter (24.3%) of respondents had been verbally abused by a stranger or person that they did not know well, an increase of 3.0% from 2007. Of the 98 respondents, more than one-quarter (27.6%) were aware the stranger or person in question had been drinking alcohol prior to or during the incident.
- Strangers had physically abused 4.5% of respondents over the past 12 months, an increase on the results for 2007 (3.3%). Over one-third of these respondents (38.9%) were aware their assailant had been drinking alcohol.
- A total of 4.0% of respondents had been frightened for the safety of themselves or family/friends because of the anger, threats or violence of a partner/former partner, up from the 2.7% recorded in 2007 and similar to the 4.4% recorded in 2005. For more than two-thirds (43.8%) of these 16 respondents, alcohol had been consumed by their partner/former partner.
- A further 13.2% of respondents stated that they or someone else in their household had been a victim of a crime (not previously mentioned) over the past 12 months. Crimes mentioned included assault, road rage, theft from a retail business or community facility, suspicious or threatening telephone calls, prowlers, vandalism, theft from property and business related crime. Of the 54 incidences listed, four involved alcohol.
- A total of 34 respondents (8.4%) stated that they had witnessed, or been a victim of a crime, that they had not reported to the police, compared to 10.4% in 2007, 10.1% in 2006 and 12.7% in 2005.

## Awareness of Crime Reducing Initiatives


- Awareness of the Community Policing Centre decreased slightly in the 2008 survey. A total of 363 respondents (90.1%) were aware there is a Community Policing Centre in the central city area (compared with 90.6% in 2007, 85.5% in 2006 and 82.4% in 2005). In 2008, 93.4% of these respondents who were aware of the Community Policing Centre were able to pinpoint its correct location at the City Focus.



- More than three-quarters of respondents (77.2%) were aware of CCTV in the central city area; a negligible decrease in awareness since 2007. Of these respondents, 75.5% believed CCTV to be 'very useful' or 'useful' in making the central city area a safer place (an increase from the 70.8% recorded in 2007).



- A total of 76.9% of respondents were aware of the liquor ban currently in effect in the central city area. This is an increase from awareness levels in previous years. Of these respondents, 74.5% believed the ban to be 'very useful' or 'useful' in making the central city area a safer place (up from 65.6% in 2007).




### Ways to Make Rotorua Safer


- Respondents were asked what could be done to make Rotorua a safer place. As respondents could state more than one answer the following percentages are not additive. Comments related to:
  - Policing (30.0%)
  - More security (ie, guards, cameras and Maori wardens) (13.2%)
  - Better parenting/support for youth and removing gangs of youths/undesirables (12.9%)
  - Penalties/laws (7.4%)
  - Building/street improvement (6.9%)
  - Taking responsibility for yourself and being aware (5.7%)
  - Neighbourhood support (4.5%)
  - Crime targeting tourists (4.0%).

## Sample Demographics


- Of the 403 respondents in the sample, 51.9% were female and 46.7% were male.
- Respondents were spread throughout Rotorua's electoral wards. Respondents lived in the following locations:



- Respondents' ages were as follows:



- Nearly two-thirds (63.5%) identified themselves as New Zealand European/Pakeha, followed by New Zealand Maori (30.3%), Asian (3.2%) and Pasifika (1.2%).



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## 1.0 INTRODUCTION

APR Consultants was commissioned by the Rotorua District Council to undertake an assessment of Rotorua residents' perceptions of safety within the District. This process is a repeat of research undertaken in 2005, 2006 and 2007.

The objectives of this survey were to establish Rotorua District residents' perceptions of safety with regard to:

- perceptions of general safety in the Rotorua District during daylight hours (location(s), and reason(s) for that response);
- perceptions of general safety in the Rotorua District when it is dark (location(s), and reason(s) for that response);
- vehicle safety when parked and left unattended by owner (location(s), and reason(s) for that response);
- actual incidents of crime in the Rotorua District, and the frequency of alcohol consumption by offenders (location(s), crime type, time of day etc); and
- awareness (ie, location of community policing centres in the Rotorua District, CCTV operation, existence of liquor ban).

This report presents the results of telephone interviews conducted with Rotorua District residents in 2008 and provides comparisons with the 2005, 2006 and 2007 survey results.

### 1.1 Definitions

For the purpose of this survey the following definitions have been used:

<b>Definitions</b>	
<b>CBD</b>	The Central Business District is the area between and including Kuirau Park up Ranolf Street to the Lake Front, along to Sulphur Point, down to Victoria Street and back up Ranolf Street (the area covered by the Liquor Ban Bylaw 2003). <b>Park areas</b>	All park areas in the CBD (ie, gardens, shrubs/trees) including Sulphur Point, Kuirau Park, Government Gardens and the Lake Front.

Other definitions relating to crime type are included here for the reader's reference<sup>1</sup>.

## 2.0 METHODOLOGY

A total of 403 telephone interviews were conducted with Rotorua District residents during the period 25<sup>th</sup> March to 11<sup>th</sup> May 2008.

### 2.1 Sample Details

A random sample of residential telephone numbers was generated using the Rotorua Telecom White Pages. The survey sample was based on Rotorua's four electoral wards and was structured to ensure a sufficient number of respondents from each ward. The sample was also stratified according to gender, age and ethnicity (refer to Table 1).

### 2.2 Questionnaire Development

The questionnaire for the telephone survey was similar to that used in the previous Rotorua District Perceptions of Safety Survey, with the original form designed by APR Consultants and Rotorua District Council. Minor improvements were made to the form following the 2005 research, while additional alcohol related questions were added to Q10 for the 2007 research (refer to Appendix 2).

### 2.3 Telephone Surveying Procedure

Experienced telephone interviewers were briefed and trained to a high standard regarding the survey form and the survey's objectives.

Each interview lasted 10-15 minutes on average and restrictions were placed on the times for calling respondents. Qualifiers were in place to ensure a minimum respondent age of 15 years. The survey

was administered at varying times throughout the day, and interviewers made three calling attempts to each contact in order to mitigate non-response bias.

Quota booster surveying was undertaken to ensure that the sample reflected the demographics of the Rotorua population.

## **2.4 Results and Analysis**

All responses were analysed by computer and an accuracy audit of the data entry process was undertaken on 5.0% of data. At a 95% confidence level, all results have a margin of error of +/- 4.9%.

It should be noted that all percentages in this report have been rounded to one decimal place.


A detailed analysis of the survey results has been provided in Appendix 3.

## 3.0 RESULTS

### 3.1 Safety in the Central Business District (CBD)

Respondents were asked to state how often they visit the central city area (refer to Figure 1). One-fifth of respondents (20.6%) visited the CBD daily and three-fifths (61.8%) visited on a weekly basis. A further 45 respondents (11.2%) visited fortnightly, 24 respondents (6.0%) visited monthly and 0.5% visited annually. No respondents stated they never visit the CBD. The 2008 results show a higher percentage of respondents visiting the CBD on a weekly basis (61.8%), compared to 2007 (52.8%), 2006 (55.3%) and 2005 (48.0%) results.

Figure 1 – Number of visits to Rotorua's CBD




#### 3.1.1 Overall Perception of Safety in Rotorua's CBD

Respondents felt safer in the CBD during the day-time than during the night-time.


Figure 2 – Respondents' perceptions of safety in Rotorua's CBD during the day-time

During the day-time, the majority (91.9%) of respondents stated they felt 'very safe' or 'safe'. This can be compared to results of 90.7% in 2007, 81.2% in 2006 and 86.7% in 2005, which highlights that over the last three years residents have been feeling progressively safer in the CBD during the daytime. A further 5.2% of respondents stated they felt 'neither safe nor unsafe'; similar to the 2007 results. A total of 11 respondents (2.7%) gave negative safety ratings; 2.2% stated 'unsafe' and 0.5% stated 'very unsafe'. This is a decrease from the 2007 results, returning results to the level seen in 2006 (refer to Figure 2).

Feelings of safety in the CBD during the night-time decreased in 2008, with 27.3% of respondents stating they felt 'very safe' or 'safe' (down from 28.6% in 2007). While feelings of safety have decreased compared with 2007, the 2008 results are an improvement on the 2006 and 2005 results, when 23.5% and 26.8% of respondents respectively said they felt 'very safe' or 'safe'. In 2008 a further 16.9% of respondents stated they felt 'neither safe nor unsafe'.

Around one-quarter (25.6%) of respondents gave a negative safety rating in 2007; with 21.1% stating they felt 'unsafe' and 4.5% stating 'very unsafe' (refer to Figure 3). The number of respondents who gave a negative safety rating has increased over the last three survey periods, with 23.4% of respondents feeling 'unsafe' or 'very unsafe' in the CBD at night-time in 2007 and 17.6% with the same feelings in 2006. A further 121 respondents (30.0%) did not visit the CBD during night-time hours. This is a decrease compared with all previous survey periods.

### 3.1.2 Day-Time Safety in the CBD

The 370 respondents who gave positive safety ratings were asked what factors make them feel safe in the central city during the day-time. The most commonly mentioned factor was the presence of other people (46.2% of respondents who gave a positive safety rating), a decrease from the 53.0% recorded in 2007. Both 'presence of police' (13.0%) and 'light' (11.9%) recorded increases compared to 2007 results, while 'security cameras' decreased from 2007, down to 2.4% of respondents.

A further 151 respondents (40.8%) specified other factors with comments including not being given any reason to feel unsafe, confidence in own ability to look after oneself, being a local person and knowing the area well or being in the CBD with others.

The 11 respondents who gave a negative safety rating (2.7% of the total) were asked if there are particular areas of the CBD where they felt most unsafe during the day-time. A total of nine respondents stated unsafe areas including City Focus/Post Office and Kuirau Park (each with 22.2% or two of the respondents who stated an unsafe area) and Rotorua Central Mall and the shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets (each with 11.1% or one respondent). The shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets featured in the top four in both 2007 and 2008, while City Focus/Post Office, Kuirau Park and Rotorua Central Mall have featured in the top four in all four survey periods. All of the top four locations were mentioned less frequently in 2008 than in any other survey period.

Reasons for feeling unsafe at the City Focus/Post Office during the day-time included the presence of undesirables and young people. Undesirables were also identified as making the Rotorua Central Mall unsafe, while the bad reputation and distance from the town centre made people feel unsafe in both the Kuirau Park area and at the shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets.

### 3.1.3 Night-Time Safety in the CBD

Respondents were asked what factors make them feel safe in the central city during the night-time. Factors most commonly mentioned included the presence of other people (49.1%), light (18.2%), the presence of police (10.9%) and security cameras (8.2%). All these factors increased in frequency compared with 2007, with the exception of 'light' which decreased by 5.3%, following a decrease of all factors between 2006 and 2007.

A total of 56 respondents (50.9%) specified other factors which make them feel safe at night-time including always with others, no experience of trouble, and a sense of confidence in self. A number of respondents indicated they are not out late, and do not go to isolated areas.

The 103 respondents who gave a negative safety rating (25.6% of the total) were asked if there are particular areas of the CBD where they felt most unsafe during the night-time; 60.2% (62 people) stated yes, a decrease from the 81.5% recorded in 2007, but an increase from the 2005 and 2006 results.

A total of 12.9% of respondents who specified unsafe areas, felt unsafe everywhere in the CBD during the night-time, down from 18.6% in 2007. Areas specified as most unsafe included City Focus/Post Office and the shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets (each with 27.4%), The Streat (24.2%), and the Lake Front (22.6%). With the exception of The Streat, all four locations recorded a decrease in mentions compared with 2007.

In 2007 Kuirau Park, City Focus/Post Office, the Lake Front and the shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets were identified as the most unsafe areas.

Reasons for feeling unsafe at the City Focus/Post Office area during the night-time included the presence of undesirables and groups of young people, negative personal experience in the area, frequency of crime and the number of bars/clubs nearby. Reasons for feeling unsafe around the shops on Pukuatua, Haupapa and Arawa streets included poor lighting, the number of bars/clubs, especially those with "rowdy" elements and the presence of undesirables/young people. Drunks, the proximity to bars/clubs and groups of young people were mentioned as reasons for feeling unsafe around The Streat, while groups of young people/undesirables, the reputation of the area and the lack of people around were identified as making the Lake Front unsafe during the night-time.


### 3.2 Vehicle Safety

#### 3.2.1 Vehicle Safety in the CBD

Respondents were asked if they worry about their vehicle being broken into or stolen when parked in Rotorua's CBD, at any time during the day or night.


During the day-time, 16.6% stated that they 'always worry' or 'usually worry' (9.4% and 7.2% respectively) about their vehicle; this is an increase from the 15.8% recorded in 2007, but down from the 2006 and 2005 results (20.6% and 20.5% respectively). A further 24.6% stated that they 'sometimes worry', while more than half of respondents (53.1%) 'never worry'. A total of 23 respondents (5.7%) indicated they did not park in the CBD during the day-time (compared with 4.1% in 2007).

More respondents were worried about their vehicle being broken into or stolen when parked in Rotorua's CBD during the night-time than during the daytime. Nearly one-third (31.3%) stated that they 'always worry' or 'usually worry' (9.4% and 7.2% respectively); this is an increase from the 25.9% recorded in 2007, with respondents who 'always worry' increasing by 6.7%. In 2008, 22.8% 'sometimes worry' and 14.6% 'never worry' (refer to Figure 5). Nearly one-third of respondents (30.5%) did not park in the CBD during the night-time compared with 35.3% in 2007, 39.7% in 2006 and 35.1% in the 2005 survey.

More than one-half of respondents (57.8%) felt there are unsafe places to park their vehicle within the central city area; this is a decrease from both the 2007 results (63.7%) and the 2006 results (66.7%). A further 19.1% felt there were no unsafe areas to park, while a similar number (20.8%) did not know.

Places identified as being most unsafe to park a vehicle in the CBD included Kuirau Park (29.6% of respondents who identified an unsafe place to park), the Lake Front (29.2%), the Government Gardens (20.6%) and the Polynesian Spa (18.9%) (refer to Table 4).

A total of 25 respondents (10.7%) felt unsafe parking everywhere in the CBD; a similar result to 2007.

In 2006 the places identified as most unsafe to park were the same as in 2008, while in 2007 and 2005 the places identified as most unsafe to park included Kuirau Park, the Lake Front, the Government Gardens and Rotorua Central Mall.

Other areas identified as being unsafe to park by 37.3% of respondents (who identified an unsafe place to park) included supermarket car parks, areas near to the hospitals, side streets, the area around the movie theatre and Spotlight, the area near the car parking building, around the Convention Centre, streets close to the Lake Front (ie, Pukaki, Whakaue and Rangiuru), Amohia Street and Hinemaru Street.

Respondents gave a variety of reasons as to why certain areas are unsafe to park within Rotorua's CBD. General comments included isolated locations, poor street lighting, the high number of break-ins and vehicle theft, locations that are targeted for break-ins (ie, tourist areas), personal experience with vehicle crime and the presence of 'undesirables'.

Kuirau Park was described to be isolated at night-time with numerous places for people to hide, the presence of undesirables, poor lighting/darkness, a poor reputation and a history of break-ins and theft of vehicles. Reasons for feeling unsafe at the Lake Front included poor lighting and darkness, the high number of break-ins in the area, low foot traffic, isolation and the presence of undesirables and groups of young people. Respondents felt that the Government Gardens area was unsafe for parking due to it having a reputation for being a targeted location for tourist crime, the frequency of break-ins and thefts, the isolation and poor lighting/darkness of the area.

### 3.2.2 Vehicle Safety around Rotorua

Around three-fifths of respondents (61.5% or 248 people) felt that there are unsafe places to park a vehicle in other areas around Rotorua; this is a decrease of 5.6% on the 2007 results. A total of 15.4% of respondents felt there are no unsafe places to park in other areas (compared with 12.9% in 2007) and a further 21.6% of respondents did not know (compared to 19.4% in 2007).

Places perceived by respondents to be most unsafe to park a vehicle around Rotorua included the Redwood Forest car park (26.6% of respondents who identified an unsafe place to park), the Blue and Green lakes (23.4%), Okere Falls (21.8%) and Kerosene Creek (14.9%) (refer to Table 5). The same locations were identified in 2007 and 2006 as being most unsafe to park (in varying orders).

Other locations specified as unsafe by 115 respondents (46.4% of respondents who identified an unsafe place to park) included the lakes and boat ramps, the International Stadium and reserves. Many tourist attractions were also seen to be unsafe including “all tourist areas”, the Agrodome, Buried Village, Hell’s Gate, Skyline Skyrider and Te Puia. Suburbs highlighted as unsafe to park a vehicle included Ngongotaha, Fordlands, Fairy Springs, Western Heights, Koutu, Fenton Park, Te Ngae, Glenholme and Hamurana.


### 3.3 Safety in the Local Neighbourhood

Respondents were asked to state how safe they normally feel in their local neighbourhood.

During the day-time, the majority of respondents (89.8%) felt either ‘very safe’ or ‘safe’ in their local neighbourhood (49.1% and 40.7% respectively), compared with 91.2% in 2007. While the 2008 results show a decrease in feelings of safety compared with 2007, the 2008 results are an improvement on the 83.5% and 84.5% recorded in 2006 and 2005 respectively.


A further 4.7% stated that they felt ‘neither safe nor unsafe’, while 4.0% stated ‘unsafe’ and four respondents (1.0%) felt ‘very unsafe’ (refer to Figure 6).

As in previous surveys, respondents felt less safe in their local neighbourhood during the night-time; almost three-quarters of respondents (73.2%) felt either 'very safe' or 'safe' (29.5% and 43.7% respectively). These results are down slightly compared with 2007 results (76.9%), but an improvement compared with 2006 (65.6%) and 2005 (72.6%) results. A further 11.4% of respondents felt 'neither safe nor unsafe' while 14.2% stated either 'unsafe' or 'very unsafe' (11.7% and 2.5% respectively) an increase compared with 2007 results (refer to Figure 7).

Figure 7 – Respondents' perceptions of safety in their local neighbourhood during the night-time




### 3.4 Safety in the Home

Respondents were also asked to state how safe they normally feel in their home.


During the day-time, 93.8% of respondents felt either ‘very safe’ or ‘safe’ in their own home (56.6% and 37.2% respectively), compared with 92.7% in 2007, taking results back to 2006 levels of perceived safety. A further 2.7% stated that they felt ‘neither safe nor unsafe’, while 3.2% stated they felt either ‘unsafe’ or ‘very unsafe’ (refer to Figure 8).


Figure 9 – Respondents’ perceptions of safety in their home during the night-time

As in previous surveys, respondents felt less safe in their home during the night-time, with 85.1% of respondents feeling either ‘very safe’ or ‘safe’ (43.7% and 41.1% respectively), compared with 84.9% in 2007. A further 7.9% of respondents stated that they felt ‘neither safe nor unsafe’ while 6.7% stated either ‘unsafe’ or ‘very unsafe’ (5.5% and 1.2% respectively) (refer to Figure 9).

### 3.5 Safety in Rotorua


Figure 10 – Is Rotorua generally a safe place to live?

When asked if Rotorua is generally a safe place to live, more than four-fifths (82.9%) stated 'definitely' or 'mostly' (24.6% and 58.3% respectively). This is an increase on all three previous surveys; with those respondents who stated 'definitely' increasing by 6.2% from the 2007 results (refer to Figure 10). In 2008 a further 13.9% of respondents stated 'not really', the smallest number recorded in all four survey periods. Ten respondents (2.5%) stated 'definitely not', while three respondents (0.7%) did not know if Rotorua is generally a safe place to live.

The 66 respondents (16.4% of the total sample) who stated Rotorua is 'not really'/definitely not' a safe place to live gave reasons including a high crime rate/too much crime (65.2% of those respondents who stated that Rotorua is 'not really'/definitely not' a safe place to live), not safe in some areas/undesirables (28.8%) and problems with young people/street kids/not enough to do (24.2%) (refer to Figure 11). Further reasons specified included too many burglaries/home invasions and assaults/muggings/physical violence (each with 22.7%). With the exception of high crime rate/too much crime, all factors recorded a decrease in 2008 compared with 2007, with too many burglaries/home invasions down by nearly 30%.


A total of 21 respondents (31.8%) identified other reasons including drugs, gangs, unemployment, media profile of crime, less police, tourist related crime and personal experience with crime.

When asked about trusting other people, 46.9% of respondents stated they ‘can trust people’, an increase on previous years’ results. The number of respondents who stated you ‘can’t be too careful when dealing with people’ has decreased 2.1% since the 2007 results of 46.0%, which was itself an increase from 2006 (9.9%). The number of respondents who could not make a distinction in their trust of other people (7.4%) has decreased since 2006 (refer to Figure 12).

### 3.6 Personal Experience with Crime

Respondents were asked to comment on various actual incidents of crime that may have happened to them or members of their family over the past 12 months (ie, since March 2007) (refer to Table 6).

A total of 7.9% of respondents identified that they, or someone in their household, had their vehicle, bike or motorcycle stolen over the past 12 months, while 16.6% identified that they, or someone in their household, had had items stolen from their vehicle. Both these indicators reversed their previous trends of small decreases to record an increase in the frequency of mentions since 2007.

The number of respondents who have experienced someone gaining entry into their home or garage without permission in the past 12 months continued on a small but steady increase to reach 13.2% in 2008, up from 12.5% in 2007 and 11.8% in 2006.

A further 1.0% (or four respondents) had been victim to theft (or attempted theft) of items they were carrying, continuing the trend of small but steady decreases since 2005.

Strangers had physically abused 4.5% of respondents over the past 12 months (ie, hit, kicked or punched them or used other violence against them), an increase on the results for 2007 (3.3%). Over one-third of these respondents (38.9%) were aware their assailant had been drinking alcohol, a decrease from the 41.2% recorded in 2007.

Around one-quarter (24.3%) of respondents had been verbally abused by a stranger or person that they did not know well, an increase of 3.0% from 2007, following a 9.1% decrease between 2006 and 2007. Of the 98 respondents, more than one-quarter (27.6%) were aware the stranger or person in question had been drinking alcohol prior to or during the incident.

A total of 4.0% of respondents had been frightened for the safety of themselves or family/friends because of the anger, threats or violence of a partner/former partner, up from the 2.7% recorded in 2007 and similar to the 4.4% recorded in 2005. For more than two-thirds (43.8%) of these 16 respondents, alcohol had been consumed by their partner/former partner.

A further 13.2% of respondents identified other crimes committed against themselves, or someone in their household, within the past 12 months. Comments around violent crime (such as assault) included “son got attacked outside City Focus area at night” and “I was attacked by my flatmate at home”.

Other crimes identified included road rage, dog attack, theft from a retail business or community facility (eg, “my handbag was stolen at the Aquatic Centre”), threatening behaviour, bullying of children (eg, “texting abuse my teenage children experience”), suspicious or threatening telephone calls (eg, “had phone calls with heavy breathing and then they hang up”) and prowlers (eg, “someone has entered my section and belted on my window at midnight”).

Respondents had been victim to many different home/property related crimes including vandalism (eg, “graffiti on the fence”, “our garage door has been tagged twice” and “a window was smashed by throwing a beer bottle through it”) and theft (eg, “BBQ was stolen from our back yard”, “two concrete urns stolen off our terrace” and “theft from letterbox”).

Other respondents identified business related crime such as fraud (eg, “someone committed fraud on my son-in-law’s business and stole his database”), shoplifting and businesses being burgled.

Other comments related to arson, neighbouring properties housing gangs and drug dealers and a lack of compensation for goods taken.

A total of 34 respondents (8.4%) stated that they had witnessed, or been a victim of a crime, that they had not reported to the police; the number of respondents not reporting crimes has decreased by 1.9% since the 2007 survey.

### 3.7 Awareness of Crime Reducing Initiatives


#### 3.7.1 Community Policing Centre

Awareness of the Community Policing Centre decreased slightly in the 2008 survey. A total of 363 respondents (90.1%) were aware there is a Community Policing Centre in the central city area (compared with 90.6% in 2007, 85.5% in 2006 and 82.4% in 2005) (refer to Figure 13).

The majority (93.4%) of those aware of the Community Policing Centre in the central city area were able to pinpoint its correct location at the City Focus (with some respondents stating “centre of town”, “Hinemoa and Tutanekai streets” and “under the sails”). This is an increase from 2007, when 91.6% could pinpoint the correct location.

A further nine respondents (2.5%) did not know and 13 respondents (3.6%) gave an incorrect location (ie, Central Mall, Community House, Fenton Street and Te Ngae). In 2007, 4.3% of respondents gave an incorrect location.

Figure 13 – Respondents’ awareness of the Community Policing Centre in Rotorua’s CBD




#### 3.7.2 Closed Circuit Television Cameras (CCTV)

A total of 311 respondents (77.2%) were aware of CCTV operating in the central city area. This is a negligible decrease in awareness since 2007 (77.9%), which itself was an increase from both 2006 and 2005 (refer to Figure 14).

Of these 311 respondents, 42.4% believed CCTV to be ‘very useful’ in making the central city area a safer place (decreasing for the second consecutive year), while 33.1% believed them to be ‘useful’ (an increase of 6.0% from the 2007 survey). A further 12.5% of respondents stated they were of ‘some use’ while 6.1% stated ‘not very useful’ or ‘not at all useful’. A total of 18 respondents (5.8%) did not know.

Figure 14 – Respondents' awareness of CCTV operating in Rotorua's CBD




### 3.7.3 Liquor Ban

There has been a continual increase in awareness since 2005 in regard to the liquor ban in effect in the central city. A total of 310 respondents (76.9%) were aware of the liquor ban, compared with 74.0% in 2007, 71.3% in 2006 and 70.1% in 2005 (refer to Figure 15).

Of these 310 respondents, 45.8% believed the ban to be 'very useful' in making the central city area a safer place (an increase of 8.0% from 2007), while 28.7% believed the ban to be 'useful'. A further 12.3% of respondents believed the ban to be of 'some use' while 9.0% stated 'not very useful' or 'not at all useful' (a decrease of 3.4% from 2007). A total of 12 respondents (3.9%) did not know how useful the liquor ban was.

### 3.7.4 Ways to Make Rotorua Safer

Respondents were asked what could be done to make Rotorua a safer place (refer to Table 7). As in all three previous surveys, many comments were made regarding policing (made by 30.0% of respondents). The majority of these comments were around increasing the police presence with many comments relating to a need for more police 'on the beat' (eg, "more cops on the beat", "more police on foot patrol in the city" and "have a visible police presence in the central city").

More security (ie, guards, manned cameras and Maori Wardens) was identified by 13.2% of respondents. Comments made regarding Maori Wardens and security patrols included "have Maori Wardens in the CBD", "more Maori Wardens - they should be paid by the Council", "promote Neighbourhood Watch and Night Owl schemes" and "more patrols of tourist areas". Numerous respondents commented on the need for more security cameras, with comments including "have more CCTV all over the CBD", "security cameras in toilets", "more security cameras around town" and "have more security television".

Better parenting, support for youth and keeping youth off the streets were seen as important by 12.9% of respondents. Issues raised included educating parents and ensuring they take responsibility for their children (eg, "parents should stay home and look after their children instead of going out boozing" and "parent responsibility for children in town alone at night"), implementation of a curfew (eg, "have a curfew for teenagers") and provision of more activities for youth (eg, "more recreational activities for youth" and "more things for young people to do"). Other suggestions included reinstating corporal punishment in schools, allowing parents to discipline their children and educating young people to respect others.

A total of 7.4% of respondents discussed penalties/laws, with many recommending harsher/more appropriate sentences for offenders. Some respondents also suggested that young people committing crimes should be punished regardless of age (eg, "punish all criminals no matter how young the offender is"), while others recommended adult sentences for youth who commit adult crimes. One respondent also suggested military service for young people who get into trouble.

Building/street improvement comments made by 6.9% of respondents mostly discussed lighting in the district, with comments including "better lighting on main road areas", "have more lighting on the side streets in the CBD", "street lamps/lighting or reserves and parks" and "provide more lights in the central city". Some respondents suggested roading changes (eg, "judder bars on Basley Road to slow traffic down", "speed bumps in Fordlands and Te Ngae", "cycle lanes put in so pedestrians and cyclists don't have to share footpaths" and "cars shouldn't be able to cross Fenton Street heading south from Haupapa Street, they should have to turn left and go around the round-a-bout"), while others recommended changes to the current parking infrastructure (eg, "get rid of parking in the middle of the road" and "too small an area to get in and out of parking spots").

Taking responsibility for yourself and being aware was identified by 5.7% of respondents with increased awareness and taking reasonable precautions a theme (eg, "people need to be responsible for their own safety" and "let your neighbours know if you go away"). Increased public awareness of crime/suspicious behaviour and the need to report it was also highlighted (eg, "people need to be more vigilant in reporting crime" and "people should watch what is happening in their neighbourhood and report crime").

Neighbourhood Support comments made by 4.5% of respondents related to the set-up and promotion of Neighbourhood Watch and other neighbourhood support groups (eg, "have more Neighbourhood Watch groups", "promote neighbourhood support schemes" and "promote Neighbourhood Watch and Night Owl schemes").

Crimes targeting tourists were identified again in 2008, with 16 respondents (4.0%) making comments concerning increased security at visitor sites (eg, "more security in the tourist areas") and increased visitor awareness of possible dangers (eg, "maybe have a flyer to give visitors at the airport and backpackers, advising them how to keep themselves and their property safe").

### 3.8 Sample Demographics

#### 3.8.1 Gender

Of the 403 respondents in the total sample, there was a higher number of female respondents (51.9%) compared to male respondents (46.7%). The 2008 survey showed the largest percentage of male respondents for the four survey periods (refer to Table 8).

#### 3.8.2 Location of Residence

Respondents were spread throughout Rotorua's electoral wards; 106 respondents (26.3%) were located in the Northern electoral ward, 98 (24.3%) were located in the Southern ward, 98 (24.3%) were located in the Eastern ward and 98 respondents (24.3%) were located in the West ward.

A total of 1.7% of respondents identified that they lived in the central city, 82.6% lived in the suburbs and 9.2% lived in Ngongotaha (refer to Table 9). A further 2.0% of respondents lived in a lakeside settlement and 3.7% lived in a rural setting.

#### 3.8.3 Age

The survey sample covered a wide range of ages (refer to Table 10). A total of 19.1% of respondents were aged 15 to 34 years of age, 37.0% were aged 35 to 54 years, 32.0% were aged 55 to 74 and 10.9% were over 75 years of age.

### 3.8.4 Ethnicity

Respondents in 2008 could select any number of ethnicities they identified with. Around two-thirds of respondents (63.5%) identified as New Zealand European/Pakeha, followed by New Zealand Maori (30.3%) (refer to Table 11). Thirteen respondents (3.2%) identified as Asian and five respondents (1.2%) as Pasifika. Other ethnicities identified by 6.0% of respondents included Australian, Dutch, English and New Zealander.

## 4.0 ALCOHOL RELATED RESULTS

Project CARV (Curbing Alcohol Related Violence) began in Rotorua in February 2007, with the aim of implementing initiatives that reduce alcohol related violence. To support the monitoring and evaluation of this project, several additional alcohol-related questions were asked and an additional section of analysis included in the 2007 Survey. These questions were repeated in 2008 and are analysed below.

### 4.1 Alcohol Related Violence/Crime

Additional alcohol related questions were added to four of the questions regarding personal experience with crime over the past 12 months. Respondents were asked if, to their knowledge, a person had been drinking alcohol and the location of the incident if they answered 'yes' to any of the following questions:

- Has any stranger or person you do not know well hit you, kicked you or used force or violence on you in any way?
- Has any stranger or person you do not know well ever verbally abused you?
- Have you been frightened for the safety of yourself, your family or friends because of the anger, threats or violence of a partner or former partner?
- Are there any other types of crime that haven't been mentioned that you or anyone else in your household has been a victim of over the past 12 months?

Strangers had physically assaulted 4.5% of respondents over the past 12 months (ie, hit, kicked or punched them or used other violence against them), an increase on 1.1% from 2007. Seven of these respondents (38.9%) were aware their assailant had been drinking alcohol, a similar response to 2007 (41.2%). Of the seven incidences where alcohol was definitely involved, two occurred at home, two in specific streets near the CBD, one at a party in the suburbs, one at a Lake Front concert and one outside Rotorua Girls' High School.

Nearly one-quarter (24.3%) of respondents had been verbally abused by a stranger or person that they did not know well, an increase of 3.0% from 2007. Of the 98 respondents, 27.6% were aware the stranger or person in question had been drinking alcohol, an increase from the 2007 results (22.9%). Of the 27 incidences where alcohol was involved, the 34.6% occurred in the CBD, 38.5% occurred in the suburbs and 26.9% occurred at the respondent's place of work.

Sixteen respondents (4.0%) had been frightened for the safety of themselves or family/friends because of the anger, threats or violence of a partner/former partner, up from 2.7% in 2007. For seven of these respondents (43.8%), alcohol had been consumed by their partner/former partner, an increase from the 28.6% recorded in 2007.

A further 13.2% of respondents identified other crimes committed against themselves, or someone in their household, within the past 12 months. Of these, four respondents indicated alcohol was definitely involved. Crimes committed included two incidences of assault (both physical and verbal), one incidence of unspecified violence and one incidence of prowling. Incidences occurred in the CBD and at respondent's homes.

Crime involving alcohol occurred in a number of areas in Rotorua District in 2008. More than one-quarter (29.5%) of crime involving alcohol occurred in the CBD (down from 56.1% in 2007), while more than one-half (54.5%) occurred in various suburbs, with specific suburbs mentioned including:

- Hillcrest (five mentions);
- Glenholme (four mentions);
- Hannahs Bay (two mentions);
- Western Heights (two mentions);

- Lynmore (one mention);
- Pukehangi (one mention); and
- Te Ngae (one mention).

A further seven incidences (16.0% of crime involving alcohol) occurred at the respondents place of work.

#### 4.2 Alcohol Related Mentions

All open questions were analysed for alcohol specific mentions. The results are listed in the following table.

Of the 22 respondents who made alcohol specific mentions, 20 respondents (91.0%) stated that the proximity to bars/clubs and the number of drunks (including young people) contributed to them feeling unsafe in the CBD at night-time, while one respondent suggested that people are unpredictable, particularly when "on" something, and another felt unsafe because of a general negative attitude towards women.



A total of 20 respondents made alcohol specific mentions when asked what could be done to help make Rotorua a safer place. One-quarter of respondents (25.0%) recommended extending the liquor ban to cover specific suburbs or all of Rotorua. Three respondents (15.0%) recommended closing bars/clubs earlier and the same number suggested parents should be at home looking after their children instead of going out drinking. Raising the drinking age, reducing the number of clubs/bars and liquor outlets and clamping down on alcohol abuse were each mentioned by two respondents (10.0% each).

Other responses included reducing the number of gambling machines in bars/clubs, installing security cameras outside bars/clubs and greater control of drunkenness in bars/clubs to be exerted. One respondent suggested the lack of safety in Rotorua was a phase in society due to drugs and alcohol. Another suggested a 12 foot radius around bars where drinking was allowed, so that smokers (particularly women) did not have to leave their drinks unattended.
