



Kia ora and welcome to Rotorua...

As you explore Rotorua, well known for its bubbling mud pools, natural hot springs and beautiful lakes, you discover there's much more to this fascinating city. One thing that stands out is our unique public art collection, which acknowledges and celebrates our heritage, individuality, stories and aspirations.

Rotorua is on a journey of rejuvenation and discovery, using local art to bring life back into the heart of the city. Started back in the late 19th century the public art collection has been used to tell local stories for decades. Today these art works take many different forms and use a vast array of media. You'll find them down alleyways, disguised as fence posts, gracing the walls of buildings or in plain sight for everyone to see.

Enjoy exploring Rotorua's art trail and see the city from a different perspective. The pathway runs from Kuirau Park along 'The Green Corridor' to Government Gardens and around Sulphur Point. With many different stops and detours the trail is just as easy to walk as cycle.

The highlights tour features ten works across the city but over 50 are marked on the map so there are plenty more to see.



the theme 'The Returning Soldier'. Works from this symposium are currently displayed around the Sulphur Lake Sculpture Trail in Government Gardens.

The second symposium, from 19 – 27 November 2016, features the theme 'The Energy Within' and references Rotorua's geothermal and cultural environment. Twelve works from this symposium will refresh the current sculpture trail, and another four will be located in Kuirau Park.

Sculptural Spire Ben Benfield, concrete, 1970

Built on the site of an extinct geyser this eight metre high sculptural feature represents the dynamic growth of Rotorua and the inter-twining of Māori and Pakeha.

Stamen Sculpture

Trevor Nathan, aluminium and concrete, 2015

Depicting a pohutakawa stamen this artwork recognises the natural flora present in Kuirau Park and is a celebration of the natural surroundings.

Green Corridor Art Work Glenn McLeary, acrylic paint, 2014

This artwork takes Green Corridor users on a journey along a dirt path intertwined with a stream, and bridges for crossing the water at various points. The stream starts at the Tutanekai end of the Haupapa Street section of the corridor.

Shavings Jamie Pickernell, Wood, 2015


Representing wood shavings from a carver's chisel, this work complements Rotorua's Wood First policy and acknowledges the importance of timber and wood products to the city's economy. Shavings was created by making a scale model and then using 3D modelling software and a large milling machine.

Green Treasure John Pugh and Marc Spijkerbosch, acrylic on stucco, 2003

Make a slight detour here to check out the wonderful collection of murals at the Rotorua District Library. These murals are just some of a fast growing collection of painted murals around the city. Green Treasure depicts Lake Rotorua with blue mountains rising from the lake under the light blue sky and koru shaped ferns (green treasure) framing the mural.











Matau a Maui (Hook of Maui) Joe Kemp, wood, 2014

Maui, a legendary figure in Māori mythology, used the jawbone of his grandmother to create the matau (hook) that fished up the North Island (Te Ika A Maui), while the South Island is said to be his canoe.

Gates and carvings

The entrances to Government Gardens are works of art that welcome visitors to the space. The carvings located at the Hinemoa and Arawa Street entrances to Government Gardens were presented by the people of Ngāti Whakaue to commemorate their original gift of the land in 1880 "hei oranga mo nga iwi katoa o te ao – for the benefit of the people of the world". Created by master carver Tene Waitere and completed in 1907, they depict tribal ancestors. The Prince's Gates [1901], marked by wooden arches representing the royal crown, were erected to honour the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York.

Waitukei Lyonel Grant, bronze, 2000

This striking sculpture holds its own despite being framed by the Elizabethan-style Bath House, now Rotorua Museum. Waitukei was unveiled to mark the new millennium in June 2001. The two figures, one male and one female, were inspired by the mixing of Māori and European cultures in Rotorua.

Te Arawa Soldiers Monument W H Feldon, stone, 1927

The memorial is one of only a few erected by Maori to commemorate their men who fought and died in World War One. The monument is in the Gothic revival style.

The White Mouse

Anna Korver, Corten Steel, stainless steel, Italian marble, 2014

This was the winning work from Rotorua's first Sculpture Symposium held in 2014, which was based on the theme 'The Returning Soldier'. Since 2014, 16 works from the symposium have been on display in the 'Sulphur Sculptural Trail' transforming this largely unused space into a tranguil area for people and pukekos to enjoy!
